Section # 1 Executive Committee Corner Welcome to GTAPA

WHAT'S TO SHOW ON OUR FIRST ANNIVERSARY?

Yes, it's been one year since the concept of the Alliance was created by a group of executive members from local stamp clubs in the Greater Toronto Area. Since last January, this motley crew has met a dozen or more times to develop a working constitution, an enthusiastic executive, a representative Board of Directors, and several initiatives to spur on the philatelic organizations of the GTA. With seven member clubs and fourteen reps, the *Alliance* has begun to have an impact and a positive presence with stamp collectors and dealers.

So what do we have to show for a year's worth of effort and planning? Our most obvious initiative is the newsletter, *PhilaJournal*. While there is always a period of time that is needed to work out the kinks, I think this third issue shows the readers, a great deal has already been accomplished. Editor, Richard Weigand, has work diligently to get clubs to contribute and to develop a newsletter that keeps clubs informed about the work of the *Alliance* and to share club activities with the larger community. A first-class communications paper takes time and effort to develop, and we are on the way!

Two initiatives we have begun to put into place are the organization of a speaker's list, to help clubs identify and invite speakers to their meetings, and a symposium on youth, representatives from all clubs to meet and identify what can be done to provide a boost to youth progams. We have organized two excursions to Hanover Ontario, to take in the Royale at the end of May. Tickets for that trip will be on sale very soon from your club reps. If you need more information about these day's excursions, speak to your club rep.

At our January Board meeting, we unanimously voted to hold an Alliance event next fall. While many of the details are yet to be worked out, I can tell you that several decisions are already firm. There will be a competitive exhibition for the clubs to enter three, one-frame collections from their own shows held this spring. A trophy has been commissioned as the grand prize, which will be awarded to the winning club. We are hoping that this event can be held in conjunction with the Canadian Stamp Dealer's Association Show in October. There will be other events at the show that will hopefully include; speakers, workshops/seminars and a youth program. A more complete outline will be available in the next few months. In the meantime, keep working on those exhibits, and if you haven't started yet, do roll up the sleeves now!

The Alliance is a vibrant and energetic organization, and I hope our work merits your continued support. Please feel free to contact us if you have concerns or suggestions on how we might better serve the clubs. We are always grateful for good council and helpful feedback.

Bramalea Stamp Club Joins GTAPA
The Board is pleased to announce that the

Alliance. Representatives Bob Thorne and Steve
Singh attended our January meeting and were
enthusiastically welcomed by the Board.

"Where did you get the name PhilaJournal?"

"Where did you get the name PhilaJournal?"

Good question! The answer is that we took the words "philatelic" and "journal" and created a contraction. We thought the word, journal, "a periodical esp. an academic one dealing with a specialized subject" Canadian Oxford Dictionary, suited our publication better than the word "newsletter".

Another question might be, "Where does the word "philatelic" come from? It is the adjective, of course, of the noun, philately. To quote *Britannica On Line*, the term philately, was coined in 1864 by a Frenchman, Georges Herpin, who invented it from the Greek *philos*, "love", and *atelia*, "that which is tax free". That isn't very helpful, is it?

Looking further, I found a clearer explanation in. Fundamentals of Philately by L. N. Williams. Monsieur Herpin did write an article in Le Collectionneur de Timbres-Poste, stating that postage stamps had been collected and studied for several years since their creation and development into common usage, and referred to the then-current word, "timbremanie" impossible of acceptance to designate the pastime. He proposed that the word "philatelie" expressed the idea that the odious term "timbremanie" did not. Namely that "philatelie" from two Greek words, meaning, friend, amateur, and (in speaking of an object) free, exempt of any form of tax, and franked... made ultimate good sense. The new word signified: the love of the study of everything relating to franking. (The reader might recall that prior to the invention of the penny post, the receiver of a letter paid for the delivery, not the sender. With the sender paying the "tax", the addressee on the correspondence received the letter, "tax free". The receipt of payment, the stamp, was then cancelled, (franked) then sent on its way.)

As time passed, the term gained in popularity. In 1868, the editor of *The Stamp Collector's*

Magazine wrote, "If our readers wish to become philatelists in the true sense of the word, they must not be content with buying stamps and mounting them in an album – he must also study them." Implicit in this comment is that those who chose to merely, "buy and mount" are simply stamp collectors, while those who "study" are philatelists! A snobbish sentiment to be sure.

Over the years, the term, "stamp collector" has come to mean one who, with some knowledge of what stamps have been issued, seeks to obtain them in order to fill spaces in an album, to complete sets, or for other such reasons. A "philatelist" has come to mean one who has as a prerequisite, the knowledge of the stamp collector, and studies the stamps and the subjects, which enables him/her to classify the stamps according to their production and their use. Perhaps there is still a lingering sense of the latter being a notch above the former. For me, the difference is simply one of preference, with no value judgment as to which is preferable. Surely the enjoyment in what you do in the hobby is what is paramount.

Today, we also use the term, "specialist", as one who has as prerequisites, the background knowledge of the philatelist, and who, by intensive study, has acquired detailed and specific information about stamp production and use that he/she has created new knowledge.

I have recently read about another category that is present in the hobby, that of an accumulator. But that is for another time... another article! Aren't you glad you asked about PhilaJournal?

Annual Bourse

The North Toronto Stamp Club invites all readers of the GTAPA PhilaJournal to mark this weekend on their calendar: March 22 and 23, 2003 - when the NTSC is holding its 60th Annual Exhibition and Stamp Bourse at the Floral Hall, Edwards Gardens, 777 Lawrence Avenue East, at Leslie Street. There will be 48 frames of one-frame exhibits, competitively judged, and a bourse of 24 dealers, as well as the popular Sales Circuit, freshly renewed for this important show. Come early and stay late -- the doors open at 10 p.m. and there will be sandwiches and coffee available for our guests. The show is open from 10 am to 6 pm Saturday and 10 am to 5 pm on Sunday and features a display of competitive judged one frame exhibits. Door prizes, a silent auction and a selection of refreshments for weary stamp shoppers!

Regular Club Meetings are held the second and fourth Thursdays of each month, except for July and August (social meetings are substituted), at Yorkminster Park Baptist Church, on the east side of Yonge Street one block north of St. Clair. Parking is available for members and guests who do not use the transit system. After a short business meeting we turn to a speaker, or have a panel discussion or slide show. Business meetings begin a little before 8:00 p.m., but the Sales Circuit is generally available from 6:30 on and two or three of the Club's dealer-members

A good working library is maintained and is available to members who wish to borrow items for research purposes. Universal Postal Union (UPU)

This is the history of the UPU and its effect on postal services and philatelic activities worldwide.

Cooperation between the UPU and UN took a major leap forward in 1968 when together they setup large-scale postal projects for Africa, Asia, Latin America and Middle East countries. The UPU also works in conjunction with other related UN agencies such as International Civil Aviation Organization for the transport of airmail around the world.

Today the UPU Executive Committee meets each year and their Director General is Thomas Leavey former assistant postmaster general of the US. The UPU issues a quarterly journal Union Postale featuring articles of interest to worldwide postal authorities. The UPU works with third world countries to improve their postal services as well as technology, business and customer service issues for the remainder of its members. Today's member countries number 189 which in practical terms the UPU covers the entire population of the world.

Thirteenth Congress

The thirteenth congress was held in Brussels, Belgium on May 14 to July 11,1952 with a general agreement on the extension of literature for the blind and prisoners of war at no charge. This congress also abolished the color-coded standard established in 1897. Letter size was also amended to set a minimum standard of 4 inches x 2.75 inches. These changes were effective July 1,1953.

Fourteenth Congress

The fourteenth congress was held in Ottawa, Ontario on August 14 to October 3,1957. Although air transport charges were reduced mail rates were increased. These changes took effect April 9,1959.

Sixteenth Congress

The sixteenth congress was held in Tokyo, Japan on October 1 to November 14, 1969. At this congress the members agreed that the growing imbalance of exchanges required that the administration that receives more mailed items that it sends would compensate for the costs of conveyance, sorting and delivering of this excess international mail. This fee became known as "terminal dues."

Seventh Congress

The seventeenth congress was held in Lausenne, Switzerland to celebrate the centenary of the organization.

This congress started on May 22 and ended on July 4,1974.

Twentieth Congress

The twentieth congress was held in Beijing, China from August 23 to September 15,1999.

Countries subscribing to the UPU Rules & Regulations

The UPU has now 189 countries that subscribe to their rules and regulations. This listing is useful when you want to check on the legitimacy of a country that is new to you. The purposes of the meetings are to review guidelines for the international mail handling among its members.

The UPU is organized into four Groups/Councils:

a) Executive Council

Commissions under this council study a variety of matters including" General Affairs, Letter Post, Transit and terminal dues, Airmail, Parcel Post and technical cooperation. This group is composed of 40 members elected by the Congress with due regard for equitable geographic distribution and its members meet each year at UPU Headquarters in Berne, Switzerland. This group studies the work done by all the sections, supervises the members and makes recommendations to the members at the next congress.

b) International Bureau

This bureau handles Judicial and Administrative issues, Financial Section and Postal Studies. This is a small group elected by the UPU and meets in Berne annually to discuss methods of disseminating information about the UPU to the world. The UPU set up a "Special Fund" maintained by voluntary donations and is mainly designed for financing training, equipment for developing countries.

c) Consultative Council of Postal Studies

This section studies the future of postal studies, postal improvements, postal mechanization, postal management among other areas. This Council is composed of 35 members elected by the Congress for a 5 year term. This group also meets annually in Berne and studies major problems affecting postal administrations affecting the member countries. This Council also studies all postal matters affecting third world or developing countries.

d) Task Force for Unauthorized Postage

The UPU has recently established a task force to study unauthorized postage. The UPU has expressed concern regarding a sharp increase in the number of illegal stamps released by postal administrations without their authorization. Based on 1997 results more than 30 countries reported more than 200 stamps were issued without UPU approval. For example – Republic of Congo issued a series of stamps honoring the Atlanta 1996 Olympics. [Many of these envelopes end up in the international system and the receiving nation has problems, as they do not conform to the UPU regulations.]

International Standards Organization (ISO) ISO Standard 3166 lists all the UPU countries by two and three letter codes used for mailing purposes.

ISO Standard 4217 lists all the UPU countries and two letter codes for designation for country currencies.

Specimen Overprints

Each year three UPU members in Berne, Switzerland handle over 4 million stamps known as Specimen Overprints. Each UPU country sends 650 examples of their new issues which are them redistributed to the member countries. These stamps given to the UPU traditionally had the word "Specimen" overprinted on the stamp.

UPU Achievements

The establishment of a standard set of rules in a multinational agreement structure has created an easy method for the world's population to communicate efficiently and cost effectively.

Section #9 - Youth Corner Gearing Up for Fun - Part 2 A judicious selection of equipment

In the last column, we began to examine the details involved in starting up a youth stamp club. I suggested that the first question you should ask as you embark on this exciting journey should be, "Where do I get enough stamps?" We explored several low-cost sources of large numbers of stamps; including auction houses on the internet, local dealers, local philatelic clubs, and the post office, which always has a supply of 1- and 2-cent definitives for sale.

Stock book: a place to keep a new collection organized

Practical considerations mean that this question should really be worded, "What is the least number of pieces of equipment I can get away with buying." You will almost certainly be working with a limited budget. Most of the equipment I am going to recommend can be found for little or no money. I recommend a stock book rather than a loose-leaf album for beginners for three reasons. First, young children are still working on the fine motor skills required to manipulate hinges and loose-leaf pages in

binders. Many children find it difficult to achieve the gentle touch required to stick down stamps in traditional stamp albums. The stiff, sewn-in pages of a stock book will withstand the rough handling that young children can dish out. Second, the alphabetical-by-country classification scheme of most stamp albums presents beginning collectors with several problems; it assumes a sophisticated geopolitical knowledge, and the ability to alphabetize. Finally, even the cheapest standard stamp album is more expensive than a top quality stock book and cost is an overriding concern.

The layout of a stock book suits the needs of a beginning collector. There are many identical pages on which to classify stamps according to the characteristic that comes to mind that day. The distinguishing feature that a junior stamp collector first notices is usually the subject of the stamp. Is it any wonder that topicals are a hot commodity among the young? It makes sense because the most prominent and easily recognized feature of most stamps is the subject matter.

Their knowledge of the hobby will be growing significantly in the beginning. Every meeting, you will be teaching them something new about the world of stamps. In a future article, I will outline a core curriculum that, if presented to the children gradually, will teach them to teach themselves. They will have the skills to learn independently. Each week, you will also show-and-tell a different interesting topic in philately (more on this syllabus in a future article.)

Tongs, magnifying glass, glassine envelopes, stamp identifier, Canadian catalogue, and a plastic storage box:

Of course, even the toughest stock book pages will not stand up to repeated use by inexperienced fingers, so I supply an inexpensive pair of stamp tongs. After a lesson on their proper use, the budding philatelists will be able to give their collections the respect they deserve, while keeping the delicate glassine shelves safe for a while. Besides, using tongs whenever handling stamps, however inexpensive, is a good habit to get into.

From the beginning, I encourage the children to look closely at their stamps. This builds their observation skills. At the same time, it improves their familiarity with the stamps. For these reasons, I include an inexpensive magnifying glass with their start-up kit. Without magnification, it is difficult or impossible to recognise such features as printing technique and errors.

Collecting stamps is an ongoing process involving acquisition, preparation, organisation, and display. Every collector has stamps-in-process: stamps that have not been displayed yet. There are also the inevitable "traders". I help my students organize the stamps that live outside their stock books by supplying them with glassine envelopes, which they label and use to keep errant stamps in order. They receive their weekly supply of new stamps in glassines, so there is no excuse for loose stamps.

You may wish to supply your club members with a few reference materials. The use of a stamp catalogue and a stamp identifier are valuable skills to have, but not necessary for the young beginner. Children under the age of 8 will find enough fascination in the stamps themselves and the stories they tell. Older beginners may find the level of detail involved in reference materials appealing. I have had the greatest success when I have waited to introduce youth to catalogues and identifiers until they are "senior members" with one year experience collecting stamps. Do not forget a Rubbermaid-style box large enough to hold everything.

You may have noticed that I have not introduced the club members to mounting stamps on pages with hinges. I usually wait until one of the last meetings to show the club members how to do it (school clubs often run for a single school term.) That way, they can make it their final project to create a single display page of their favourite stamps. This could be augmented with headings and captions or not, depending on their writing ability. A display of everyone's "final project" in the school lobby will look impressive and be the best advertising for your club. Parents, staff, and other students will see how interesting the Philately Club can be.

Different is good: a place for all

To me, each of these junior philatelists is doing what I told them to do. They are looking carefully at their stamps, noticing the things they have in common, and discovering features that make them unique. Who is to say that their categories are more or less legitimate than the ones in my album? Or yours? They are

practicing careful observation and organisation according to classification schemes that matter to them. There is no better place to start than the basic skills of collecting. For my part, I encourage them and congratulate them on becoming collectors. At the same time, I teach them that there are other ways to classify stamps, such as, perforation, paper type, cancellation type, printing technique, I even show them phosphor tagging with a portable UV light. However, I have to be honest, I am not sure whose categories make more sense: theirs or mine.


