



IF YOU DON'T USE THEM, WHO WILL? (Part I)

I 've been thinking lately of the frustration I continually experience with collectors who don't use commemorative stamps on their mail. I have been keeping a file of articles and editorial comments from the philatelic press, which try to get at the issue of the declining use of commemorative stamps. It's time to write about my strongly held conviction... Use commemorative stamps always. If we don't, who will?

Writing in the Canadian Philatelist, March/April 2001, Dale Spiers provides some insights into the use of commemorative stamps (pages 81 & 82), although no suggestions on how collectors could deal with such dilemmas, are put forth. I would like to counter the comments by offering my thoughts on how collectors can make a difference.

Commemoratives are often not easily available from branch post offices, as philatelists discover who buy them for ordinary mail. Postal clerks generally don't like the extra paperwork involved in ordering them, or suffer from a boss who can't be bothered with them. One Canadian postie, told of how he was disciplined by his supervisor for ordering a selection of commemoratives instead of the usual definitives.

A colleague says he thinks he is making a difference on behalf of stamp collectors. He nicely told his local postal clerk that if he no longer ordered commemorative stamps for his customer's use, he would no longer do business there. His purchases previously were for personal and business use. He mentioned that he would also make sure friends, relatives and neighbours would here of his stance. The post office now has commemorative stamps always in stock.

That commemorative stamps are not used by the majority of people on their mailings, is a truism in the philatelic hobby, as anyone who has access to bulk incoming mail knows... Further, there is considerable variability in the use of commemoratives, but roughly only about 10% of postage used by the general public is commemorative.

Then let's rededicate ourselves to the task of getting more folks to use them. This is not rocket science. I have received far too many letters from collectors this past year with definitive stamps on them. These were from fellow collectors, even presidents of stamp clubs, both of whom should know better. If you can't get commemoratives from a post office, the easiest way is to phone Antigonish (1-800-565-4362) and order some from the National Philatelic Centre. The stamps arrive in a few days and there is no postage charge and you can even use VISA. What could be more convenient? More about this aspect of the issue later.

Will the use of commemoratives decline in the future? This depends entirely on how post offices push stamp sales to the general public. Philatelists don't enter into it, since they are a small proportion of those who buy commemoratives.

Sorry, while we may well be in the minority, I'll have to take strong opposition to that one. I can do as much, or as little, as my conscience will bare (Thus this article). I can make sure I take every opportunity to encourage others to follow, or shrug my shoulders and say it's not my problem. Here is a clipping I cut from a Letters to the Editor column a few years ago. I didn't record the writer or the publication, but the person wrote,

"Rather than bemoaning the fact that there were too many stamps issued, not enough commemoratives and too many lousy cancellations, I produced a small slip of paper that I include in all my philatelic mail. It states: If more stamp collectors would use more collectable stamps on their outgoing mail, more collectors would have more collectable stamps in their collections."

What other strategies can we use to get more people not just collectors, to use commemoratives? Here are a few that I have collected from friends and readings:

A club member told me that he wrote to several stamp dealers and auction houses that if they persisted in using metered labels for philatelic mail, he would no longer do business with them. He received a few responses; the fact that putting stamps on mail takes too much time, dealers would have to hire more staff to do the extra work involved, metered mail allows better cost tracking and reduces theft, you have heard them all before. He simply put together a package of covers from dealers from whom he has received recent mail, with commemorative stamps and nice cancellations. Whatever the inherent problems, these dealers felt strongly about helping collectors. He also included a quotation: "You are either part of the problem or part of the solution."

My wife and I always volunteer to mail out flyers for our book club, newsletters for the stamp club, rehearsal announcements for our choir... you get the picture. We use commemoratives and request that the envelopes are saved for us, or for anyone else who collects. The response is always positive and many people have remarked on what a good idea it is to share our common history, geography, culture and patriotism by using, "the big, colorful stamps with nice pictures." We always use a fun-filled note about helping an ol' starving philatelist at Christmas time by requesting of everyone to save their envelopes for... you know who. From strategies like these, I receive dozens of commemoratives monthly, when meeting and visiting friends and family.

Finally, here is one I read in an article proposing a similar commitment to spreading the good word about commemoratives. I am in the process of designing a rubber stamp that will say, "PLEASE USE COMMEMORATIVE STAMPS. LEARN MORE ABOUT CANADA AND HELP A STAMP COLLECTOR!"

What do you do to make sure commemoratives are the choice for stamps for your mailings? Send the idea to Clippings & Commentary, and we'll add them to the list for our readers to consider.

Next issue I will share the special activities of two fine gentlemen. They also are stamp collectors with a passion for the hobby, and a unique way of getting their colleagues and even non-collectors, to buy into a commitment to share commemorative stamps on their mail. Please don't forget... If you don't use them who will?

50 YEARS AGO

Looking back, the summer of 1953 appears to have been pretty dull. The October issue of the Canadian Philatelist featured little news.

There is a 3/4 page article entitled "What's This National Stamp Week all About?" In part, the article states "The main attractions during a National Stamp Week should be Exhibitions and the public invited to attend. The C.S.D.A. has started the ball rolling and donated a sum of money to a fund which will be used for the

promoting of the hobby. An exhibition will be staged by the local clubs (in Toronto)." Was this the fore runner of the GTAPA / CSDA partnership that gave birth to STAMPEX 2003?

The article submitted by a member was "Canada -Booklets, Coils & Straight Edges" by E.C. Powell. Other articles include a brief discussion of the merits of collecting either classics or modern stamps; a short story about the Perot Postmasters-Bermuda 1848-61, and a brief article about the Caribou Issue of Newfoundland.

A feature of BNA Topics for June 1953 was the reprint of a Toronto Telegram article on the Bluenose and Captain Angus Walters. That item is reprinted in its entirety elsewhere in this issue of Phila Journal.

November saw the first part of an in-depth report on the Coil Postage Stamps of Canada by Edward Whiting.

For fans of the Cents Issue of 1859, Henry Gates presented an article entitled The Dies for the 1859 Issue in December. The Postal History column by Jim Goodwin presented a fascinating list of all steamships that operated on Lake Ontario before 1846





BLUENOSE - SHE RULED THE SEAS by Wesley Hicks

Taptain Angus Walters ✓unveiled a plaque vesterday down in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, to commemorate the feats of a schooner called the Bluenose. Memories like the wash of green water over a racing schooner's bow must have flooded over tough, fiery Angus Walters as he unveiled the plaque on Lunenburg's 200th anniversary.





"Old Stormalong" she was dubbed. And men who knew the sea said she was the greatest topmast schooner the world ever knew.

"Old Weatherleg" she was nicknamed. And men who knew the sea said there was never a ship could sail to windward with her and when she was heeled over in a stiff breeze on a close reach or hard on in the wind, she sliced along with an almost dry deck and was a dancing ghost on the waves.

She was queen of the North Atlantic and a work horse to boot. The late King George V, on the occasion of his Golden Jubilee, gave her a new set of sails which had been

intended for his own yacht, Britannia.

No one but Angus Walters could have unveiled the plaque to her yesterday. He still has her wheel. And locked in a trunk in his attic are the original plans for the ship. Since the day she was launched, they have been locked away so no builder could ever copy her.

No shipbuilder could ever copy her bow which was built by rule-of-thumb. Men who sailed in her said, in the heaviest of seas, under racing sail, her bow wash was never more than a light spray and mermaids played around rainbows in it.

On April 15, 1921, she was given her first trial run and Captain Angus Walters, who was renowned for his skill and judgment and courage, was at the helm.

The Bluenose was built to be a freighter as well as a fisherman. She was built to spend long weeks on the Grand Banks, 36,000 square miles of the most exclusive cod fisheries in the world, and then carry her salted catch to Portugal, the West Indies or Brazil.

On October 22, and again on October 24, 1921, she raced the Elsie off Halifax. The Elsie was out of Gloucester and was built for speed, built to carry fresh fish to nearby ports. But the Bluenose beat her. She beat her by 11 minutes over the 30 mile course the first day and by 13 minutes the second day to win the International Fisherman's Trophy.

In 1922, she whipped the Henry Ford and Gloucesterman. On the outward leg of the triangular course, the two ships rode so close together in light airs that insults were exchanged in conversational tones. Then, as the ships rounded the buoy for the homeward leg, a stiff breeze blew up to windward. Then Captain Walters cupped his hands and addressed the Henry Ford.

"If you gentlemen got anything to say to us," he said, "say it now. From now on, it'll cost you postage." Then the Bluenose romped away from the Henry Ford.

She won the trophy in 1923 from the Gloucesterman Columbia. And in October 1931, after 10 years on the Grand Banks, innumerable storms, and four days on the rocks at Placentia, Newfoundland, she came back to whip the Gertrude L. Thebaud, out of Gloucester, for the supremacy of the North Atlantic. And she beat the Thebaud again in 1938 in the last of the Trophy Races.

In 1942, with two diesels bedded in her, she was sold to the West Indies Tea Company. And in January, 1946, a humble tramp ship, she fouled a reef near Isle Vache, off the coast of Haiti, and sunk.

"Old Weatherleg" they called her, and "Old Stormalong." And she sails under full canvas on the Canadian 50 cent stamp which philatelists have called the most beautiful in the world. And she sails under full canvas on the back of Canada's ten cent piece, which she shares with a lovely young queen.



And it was most fitting that Captain Angus Walters unveiled a plaque to her memory yesterday. For he spoke her epitaph back in 1946 when he was told she had sunk off Haiti in the night. "She belonged to all Canada," he said.

The Club Challenge Award was won by the North Toronto Stamp Club: whose members Doug Irwin. Don Welsh and John Wilson, combined the highest score. Here are the results:

THE POSTILLION

Postmarks in Europe



arliest examples of a postmark in Europe consist of injunctions to the postal officials not to delay state correspondence. A formula used in Venice by the early 14th century was the Latin "Cito, citissime, volantissime" (quickly, very quickly, very fleetingly). By the 16th century the French were endorsing their mail "en diligence" (with speed and care), and it is from this endorsement that French mailcoaches came to be known as diligences. In Tudor England a common expression on the covers of letters was "Haste, haste, for life, post haste" and this, in turn, has given the language an expression meaning with all speed.

Many of the more important state letters bore the signatures of the respective postmasters through whose hands they passed en route, together with the times of arrival and departure. Such express letters are of considerable interest to postal historians for the light they shed on medieval mail routes and the time it took to cover these routes.

Only when the state services were thrown open to the general public did a system of manuscript marking come in to use to denote the amount of postage due from the recipient. Even after the introduction of handstruck postmarks, charges were often indicated in manuscript-black ink for postage due and red ink or crayon for prepaid letters.
