The hobby makes a foray at the 50 Plus Show!

Under the general coordination of **Paul Winkler**, Chair of the Stakeholders in Philately (SIP) group and Publisher of the Canadian Stamp News (CSN), and led by the Greater Toronto Area Philatelic Alliance (GTAPA), the Grand River Valley Philatelic Association GRVPA), Canada Post and CSN, for the first time philately, made its appearance at the annual "50 Plus Healthy Lifestyle and Travel Show" held on April 30 and May 1, 2004, at the International Centre in Mississauga, ON.

The possibility of a philatelic participation of this type of show was introduced by Mr. Winkler at the last January meeting of SIP group. After discussing the great opportunity to showcase our hobby in a territory never explored by us before, it was agreed that GTAPA would coordinate the exhibits and the seminars, Canada Post would promote its products, while CSN would be present as the philatelic media and perform the general coordination.

The two-day show is a magnet in attracting the 50+age group but we noted also the presence of a significant number of young persons who came along with their parents. Many visited our booth to inquire about and walk away with a few stamps.

Our main objective was not only to stage a first class exposure of the hobby but also to experiment the behaviour of the visiting public at our booth and displays. We were overwhelmed by the number who visited us.

 $E^{\mbox{arly in my life, my ancestors often repeated "if you sow you will reap." In time, this has been proven many times.$

In January 2001 Charles Verge (president of the RPSC) asked me to undertake a mini-study as to why people are not attracted to the hobby and what can be done to alleviate the situation.

A month later, a 5-page report was handed in to the National Federation in which I stated a few facts and provided a few recommendations for consideration. One of which was "take the show on the road" and preach. (not exactly the same words but it had the same connotation).

On April 30 and May 1, 2004, GTAPA, in cooperation with Canada Post, Canadian Stamp News and the Grand River Valley Philatelic Association, we did take the show on the road.

Representatives of these organizations participated as "exhibitors" at the Annual 50 Plus Healthy Lifestyle and Travel Show held at the International Centre in Mississauga, ON, taking up a 400 square feet of floor space and showing the public what stamp collecting is all about.

It ranged from explaining the enjoyment derived from the hobby to what you do with stamps (basic Collections on display); from docents explaining the exhibits to providing advice on how to interact with other collectors (clubs); from how to go about appraising philatelic estates to how to dispose of them; from how to learn about the habit (CSN) to acquire new stamps though postal outlets (CPC) highlighted by the presence of one of the stamp designers available to sign FDCs.

The result was a total success. At the end of the day we all asked ourselves: why have we not done this before? Read the special feature on the front page for details.

Elsewhere in the publication you will read about the recognition of two esteemed philatelists, the inaugural get-together of the Thematic Group and other interesting articles.

Do note that due to commitments made by the Executive to attend Royal 2004, in Halifax, the GTAPA annual General Meeting, scheduled for May, has been rescheduled for June 23rd and you are invited (see item in the President's report)..

Display

Ten 16-page frames of philatelic material were on display for the occasion. Nothing extravagant; but just basic collecting to attract the visiting public to the colourful and informative display.

The first Frame (created by Frank Alusio) was dedicated to the basics of collecting taking the viewer, in easy-to- follow progression, from the introduction of the first adhesive postage stamp through collecting the world, to something more manageable such as one nation, a time-period, a simple topic.

The following three frames we invited individual members (listed below) of Clubs affiliated with GTAPA to assemble one-page mini exhibits and we were overwhelmed of the response (Are these our future exhibitors?)

The fifth frame was mounted with material issued by postal administrations for the film "Lord of Rings" prepared by Peter Butler.

The sixth was a topical/thematic collection of "King of the Knight" by Karl Wysotski of Scarborough Stamp Club followed by the attractive and colourful frame of "Canadian Colorano Covers" assembled by Gord Payne of West Toronto Stamp Club. Mr. Payne also participated with another frame of FDCs on "The American Wildlife Stamps" issued by the US postal administration during CAPEX '78, World Philatelic Exhibition held in Toronto.

The attractive Display culminated with two frame exhibits one by Garfield Portch "Getting to the Fire" and one by Frank Alusio "Victoria and the Penny Black" exhibits which are ready to make an appearance on the national scene in the very near future.

Autograph Session

The special guest at our booth was Saskia van Kampen, who designed four stamps for Canada Post, including the Bryan Adams photo of the Queen stamp issued in 2004. Van Kampen, for whom we are most grateful, was signing FDCs of the stamp during the two sessions: one on Friday and one on Saturday. Indeed a popular addition to our booth.

Prospective New Collectors

During the two-day show we also learned that a good number of the visiting public were not aware of the number of stamp clubs in the GTA. In talking with various persons who visited our booth, I personally recorded that a number would come visit clubs; six to West Toronto Stamp Club; four to Scarborough; three to North York; and two to Bramalea, they and might become members. This proves that we have to make ourselves visible and be present at every opportunity to promote philately in order to attract latent and new collectors.

Philatelic Estate Appraisal Service

What we also gathered from this experience was that a number of persons among this segment of the public were seeking advise on how to go about appraising and disposing of philatelic estates. A service of this kind is barely provided but certainly is not being widely advertised. We certainly will take this into account and will ascertain that a process is put in place and available to those who need the service.

Feature


One of the successful stories of our venture was the "stamp grab container" in which literally millions clean cancelled stamps were available to the public for the taking.

These stamps were kindly donated by Etobicoke stamp collector Ted Allen to promote stamp collecting among the youth.

Through experience we found that giving stamps away for nothing gives the impression that they are useless. What we thought would be momentous was that by displaying a sign on the container saying that a

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monetary donation would be appreciated for a cause has a greater impact and meaning. It worked! The amount was collected \$41.31. It will certainly help develop the youth program.

Conclusion

All in all, it was a venture well worth the effort and we recommend it to other philatelic organizers to consider such exposure. However, this can only be achieved with the cooperation of all the stakeholders in philately with one common objective in mind: **Promote philately**.

There is a cost involved and we alone (the collectors groups) will never be able to stage such a venture; but we

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are always ready and willing to provide the expertise and the displays - all for the love of philately.

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CLIPPINGS & COMMENTARY-5

Excerpts from the philatelic press... ... and comments from Peter Butler

What's a Postage Stamp?



In the February '04 the Saugeen issue of Stamp Club's Bulletin, editor Jim Measures wrote the following, under the heading of, "What is the Role of a Postage Stamp?"

As philatelists, we need to think occasionally about the role of these little treasures that we collect and value so highly. The Gibraltar Post Office has issued a statement of what they believe is the role of a postage stamp. According to Gibraltar Post the role of the postage stamp is: "To promote understanding, communication, and international cooperation; the miniature and most prominent ambassador of the country; the cultural identity and heritage of a nation; prepayment for postal services; a specific brand image; king of hobbies."

Not much to disagree with there, Jim mused, but he was surprised that Gibraltar Post had put the "prepayment of services" fourth in a list of six roles. Surely a postal authority would list that role as number one. Jim got my vote on that thought, and it caused me to think further about the profound impact these little pieces

of paper (postage stamps) have in so many areas of a country's identity. Wouldn't it be interesting to take a look through several philatelic reference texts to find out what other sources said about the role of postage stamps. Few reference books I looked at, made such an attempt. In fact most of the indexes didn't even list a definition for what a postage stamp was, never mind its role.

At lunch the following day, I asked my stamp buddies, "So what's your definition of a postage stamp?" There was no hesitation, "A receipt for the prepayment of postal services." With the inclusion of the word, receipt, I realized that I had not looked in my copy of Robert Lowe's great book, *The British Postage Stamp*, published by the National Postal Museum in England for a definition. It was the Roland Hill concept that turned around the charges for postal service from the receiver of mail to the sender of mail. Thus the notion of prepayment started, followed with the issuance of a receipt... a postage stamp.

Here is what Roland Hill said himself, of his "invention" of the adhesive postage stamp, almost exactly as we know it today. "A bit of paper just large enough to bear the stamp and covered at the back with a glutinous wash which the user might, by applying a little moisture, attach to the letter." (The stamp in its sense meant a postage paid mark. The whole item would be a label.)

It is interesting to note that in the 1840's there was no notion that people would save the stamps and not use them. This would have been tantamount to insanity, prepaying for a service but never intending to use the service. Mint stamp collectors please take note!

The Canadian Oxford Dictionary defines a postage stamp as: "an official stamp affixed to or imprinted on a letter indicating the amount of postage paid." The author of that description forgot the rule that you can't define an object using the same word you are defining, namely "stamp." Wouldn't the word, *label* have been a better one to use? Under "stamp" alone, the dictionary says, in the fifth meaning out of ten: "a small adhesive piece of paper indicating that a price, fee or tax had been paid."

Stamp Collecting for Dummies by R.L. Sine offered this: "Stamp is a term for an adhesive label for postal purposes." Rather thin gruel for such a serious topic, don't you think?

My favourite definition comes from a text that 1 expected a lot more from, Fundamentals of Philately by L.N. Williams, and published by the American Philatelic Society. The only definition I could find was: "A stamp is a piece of paper, watermarked or un-watermarked and of a particular texture and with a particular finish, bearing a design applied by a particular process or particular processes, in a particular colour or combination of colours, with or without addition by the same or different process or processes and in the same or different colour or colours, the whole being provided or un-provided with means of easy separation."

It does go on to suggest that the definition does require a further limitation around the terms, "*used*" and

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"unused" stamps. Certain purists will cavil at the description of a stamp as a piece of paper. Thus, the above definition is offered, I suppose, as the quintessential word on what is a postage stamp. No doubt cynics would suggest that lawyers were involved in this one.

Having lowered the level considerably with that definition, let me close with this lofty description of a postage stamp. It is written in large bold letters above the entrance to the gallery of the Spellman Museum of Stamps & Postal History, Regis College, in Weston, Massachusetts, 25 miles northwest of Boston.


"Stamps are miniature documents of human history. They are the means by which a country gives sensible expression to its hopes and needs, its beliefs and ideals. They mirror the past and presage the future. They delineate cultural attainments, industrial works, domestic, civil and social life. In a word, these vignettes give a vivid picture of the world, its occupants and their multifarious endeavors."

Francis Cardinal Spellman

The Cardinal was one of America's most celebrated stamp collectors. The museum attests to his great contribution to the hobby. Unfortunately, the gallery where a part of his famous collection is displayed, was closed for renovation, the day Susan and I visited the museum. I did copy down the quotation though, for I knew some day I would find a place for such a literate description of what is a postage stamp. And there you have it. Thanks Jim Measures, for getting me going on this little journey. I hope you're satisfied!

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The Royal Philatelic Collection

Housed in St. James's Palace, the Royal Philatelic Collection is the most comprehensive collection in the world of postage stamps devoted to the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth. Although a personal asset, the collection has always been regarded as an heirloom; however, The Queen does make loans of material from the collection for display at exhibitions and next year a traveling Jubilee stamp exhibition will allow wider public access to some of the collection's most interesting treasures

Some of the younger members of the Royal Family had already started stamp collecting by 1864, but the first serious collector in the Royal Family was Prince Alfred (Queen Victoria's second son, later the Duke of Edinburgh), who was Honorary President of what is now the Royal Philatelic Society from 1890 until his death. Before his death, he sold his collection to his elder brother The Prince of Wales (later Edward VII), who later presented it to his son, The Duke of York. Some of his collection now forms a core of the Royal Philatelic Collection today.



The Duke of York (later George V) was a very able philatelist, who was executive President of the Royal Philatelic Society from 1896 until he became King in 1910, when he became its patron. An astute and enthusiastic collector, he made every effort to obtain the rarest stamps at the first available opportunity. Although the Royal Collection mainly consists of unused stamps, George V also

acquired used specimens (purchasing covers if necessary, and he was particularly keen on bisected stamps) and added air mail covers from the early routes to the Collection. The King preferred to have mint blocks of four or six stamps and in doing so set a fashion which lasts to this day.

As Duke of York, he had by 1904 bought both the 1d and 2d Post Office Mauritius of 1847 - the first stamps issued by a colonial Post Office and among the most prized stamps in the world. The Penny Orange-red was bought from a collector, and the equally matchless unused example of the 2d Blue was bought at auction in 1904 for £1,450 (then the highest price for a single stamp). A courtier was reported to have asked The Duke of York if he had seen that some fool had paid £1,450 for a postage stamp: "Yes" was the reply, "You're talking to him!"

As King, George V had to approve designs of new issues which bore his image, and a certain number of official presentations helped to build up the collection. However, by far the largest proportion came from purchases (the King employed an agent to bid for him at auctions), either as individual stamps from important collections broken up for sale by dealers, or as complete collections. Between 1907 and 1918, at least 18 important single-country collections and four collections of Great Britain were bought intact. By his death, the King's collection was housed in 328 albums (the 'Red Albums'), each of some 60 sheets. The first four albums contain the so-called Treasury essays, which were the results of the open competition which the Treasury held before the UK issued the first postage stamps in the world.

George V also took a great interest in stamp design. Once the stamp-sized artists' sketches, which were submitted for his approval, had been used by the printers for engraving the die, making plates and matching colours, they were returned for inclusion in his collection. In addition, a number of earlier sketches, die proofs etc. were purchased or given, and amongst the sketches there is one of two pairs of water colour sketches sent to Rowland Hill to show him how the designs for the proposed 1840 Penny Black and Two penny Blue would look. In collecting artists' drawings, die proofs, plate proofs and colour trials, the King was ahead of his time in recognising the importance of these items and a pioneer in this area.

Edward VIII apparently considered selling the Royal Philatelic Collection but he was advised that he could not do so: although the collection is the personal asset of the Monarch, it was and is regarded as an heirloom. George VI took a personal interest in the collection, but he did not share his father George V's specialized knowledge. Nevertheless, the Collection continued to expand and much material mounted - or still today awaiting mounting - was added during George VI's reign and is or will be in the Blue Albums.

During The Queen's reign a considerable volume of material has been acquired, much of which is still to be mounted - in time these will be in the Green Albums. Two major additions have been a collection of pre-adhesive covers of Great Britain and a collection of the pioneer air mail flights envelopes of Canada. The Queen also has a collection of first day covers from the UK and the Commonwealth which date from 1952, the year of her accession to the throne. In addition, the collection receives a mint copy of every stamp issued in the world and stamps of the UK and the Commonwealth in mint blocks of four or six.

Over the years, donations and purchases have continued -one of the most poignant and significant was that of the stamp album believed to have belonged to Tsesarevitch Alexis (murdered with his family in Russia in 1918). The album was stolen by a soldier and sold on to a worker for a British company in Russia, who brought it to this country when he fled from the Bolsheviks in 1923; the album was subsequently given to The Queen by his son, who wanted Her Majesty to have the album for her collection.

The most recent significant purchase, for £250,000, has been the famous cover bearing ten Penny Blacks used on the first day of use - 6 May 1840.

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The Royal Philatelic Collection has never been counted in terms of total stamp numbers, and it is impossible to value the collection as it contains unique items (including drawings and proofs) for which the market has never been tested. Much of the Collection remains stored in high security, carefully regulated conditions in chemical-free packets. It is estimated that there is enough material to fill another 2,000 albums - the material is kept filed for reference and study purposes.

Although much of the Collection is fragile, in that exposure to light or heat can fade or otherwise damage the stamps, examples are occasionally on public display. Each season, the opening display at the Royal Philatelic Society (of which The Queen is patron) consists of material from the Collection - a custom started shortly after the First World War by George V and continued today by The Queen. Selections from the collection are displayed once or twice a year in the United Kingdom and are also exhibited at many of the major international stamp shows (most recently in Australia, China and Bulgaria in 1999, at the Stamp Show 2000 in London and in Madrid in 2000, and in Belgium and Denmark in 2001). The exhibiting of these selections, and responsibility for the Royal Philatelic Collection as a whole is under the care of a Keeper, the current Keeper being Michael Sef. (The guest speaker at the upcoming PSSC's 50th anniversary dinner).

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50 YEARS AGO by Garfield Portch

In the Canadian Philatelist, April 1954, the bored and frustrated general collector is presented with a recommendation by Russell Waineg. He suggests that one should advance from "collecting" to "philately" and to "specialization."

The CPS was gearing up for the annual convention in Kitchener.

The US Post Office issued a new book "Postage Stamps" that contained the following statement in the forward: "The postage stamps of a nation are a picture gallery of its glories. They depict, in miniature, its famous men, the great events of its history, its natural wonders. Because of this, philately has a distinct educational value. No one can pursue the hobby intelligently without developing a greater knowledge of his national heritage." (ed. note: perhaps this is another definition to be added in the Clippings & Commentary column elsewhere in the Journal).

The lead item in BNA Topics was a set of "Notes on Postage Rates in Canada from 1897 to 1951." This contains great information for the general collector.

Of interest to the West Toronto Stamp Club, past President Everett Drake was proposed for BNAPS membership by Robert Lyman in April '54.

For those interested in the Connell Stamp of New Brunswick, the May issue provides transcripts of the correspondence relating to the issue.

Hans Reiche presented an interesting article explaining the reasons behind "Coil Jumps." ■



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THE POSTILLION

Paper was first used as writing material by the Chinese in the second century BC. It was spread overland to Western Asia by the mid-eight century AD and Arabs are known to have manufactured paper by AD 751, using flax fibres and later cotton. From Asia Minor the use of paper spread to Greece and the Byzantine Empire in the late eleventh century. The Empress Irene is reputed to have used paper about that time, although the earliest extant Greek manuscript on paper dates from the mid-thirteen century. It was first manufactured in Europe by the Moors of Spain in the twelfth century and came to Italy by way of Sicily during the Arab occupation. The oldest European document made of paper is a deed of King Roger of Sicily dated 1102. The earliest letter written on paper is dated cAD 1216 and is preserved in the Public Record Office, London. It was written by Raymond, Duke of Narbonne, to King Henry III of England. Paper was widely used for letters by the late thirteenth century, and rapidly superseded parchment.

Blotting paper is known from 1465, and was made of coarse, grey, unisized paper, yet sand continued to be popular as a drying agent until the eighteenth century. Brown paper for wrapping parcels is known from 1570. ■

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
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
