It didn't take long to figure out who should be the next editor of our Journal. Garfield Portch has been totally involved with its production since the beginning. With a background in the printing industry, Garfield was a natural to fill the shoes of Editor Alusio. It became apparent very quickly though, that with the added responsibility of the PhilaJournal, he could not carry on with the role of Vice-President. (The Editor will remain on the executive, as an ex officio member.) We, therefore, began the search for a Board member who could take on the VP responsibility. We are very pleased to announce that Robert Owczarz of the Polish-Canadian Stamp Club will take on that position immediately. Robert, since joining the Alliance last year, has brought an enthusiasm for our work that is appreciated and enjoyed by all the Directors. Can anyone who saw his exhibit on Pope John Paul II at the last STAMPEX Show, fail to be impressed with his commitment and excitement for the hobby and the work of the Alliance? So there you have it! Three Board members to three positions of responsibility, all duly installed at the April Board Meeting, and I am nothing short of thrilled to have such a dynamic team to work with through the challenging months ahead.

There's more! Board member for the East Toronto Stamp Club, Steve Haddock, has agreed to take over the responsibility for the website after Garfield has worked through the commitment to get us on line. Garfield and website designer, Doug Biggerstaff, will turn over the maintenance and future development of www/gtapa.org to Steve over the next month. Once again a talent has been identified and a willingness to help has been given. The Alliance Board is indeed, an incredible collection of committed, talented and dedicated people. They deserve a great deal of recognition and praise for their work, and they deserve your support and appreciation back at their home club.

STAMPEX Up-date

In the last issue I brought readers up-to-date on recent developments in the planning for STAMPEX '05. Here is another up-date on what's been happening recently:

- John Stuart Pryce, the artist who created our postcard of the Distillery District at last year's show, has recently completed the black and white drawing for this year's offering. John has also been selling copies of the first postcard at his gallery in the Distillery District. All proceeds are going to reduce the cost of the artwork for card #2.
- Harvey Shuter, a member of the North Toronto and North York clubs, has agreed to work with us on the production of unique FDCs for this year's show. Harvey's work is outstanding and this addition to the GTAPA booth will be a crowd pleaser for sure! Welcome to the team Harvey! (We'll publish a few examples in the next PhilaJournal.)
- After discussions with CSDA planners, our partners in STAMPEX, we have agreed to make an adjustment the admission at the year's show. This came about from our noticing that on the Sunday of the CSDA show in April, there were more families in attendance that the other two days combined. You will recall that the '05 edition was announced with an admission fee of \$5.00. We are now announcing that Friday and Saturday will remain at the \$5.00 admission charge but Sunday will be Family Day and there will be no charge for admission.
- Everyone realizes that one of the QE Building shortcomings is the lack of space for meetings, seminars and workshops. We have decided to include in the floor plan a few round tables strategically placed in the bourse, to facilitate small group sessions. Presenters will provide hands-on workshops on specific topics of interest to all collectors (e.g. "How to remove ballpoint pen, scotch tape and hinges from stamps" or "Options for making your own album pages") Sessions will be listed in the program and announced over the PA system for interested collectors to come by and join in the circle or stand by and observe when the seats have been taken.
- Our souvenir program is promising to be a wonderful reminder of the first national show in Toronto for close to a decade. It will contain over 60 pages of everything about the show to articles with reference quality information attendees will want to keep. Many advertisers have already booked their ads. Dealers wishing to place their ads should call Ernie Nyitrai (905-477-1511) soon to insure space

for their important announcements to collectors.

• We are contemplating a special edition of PhilaJournal with further up-dates on STAMPEX including mention of special discount coupons that will be included in the admission package.

That's it! STAMPEX '05 promises to be bigger and better than last year's edition. Remember our motto for this great show: ..."*a new approach to an old passion*." You can't afford to miss this one. Why not volunteer for a stint at the show as a greeter or an exhibition docent? How about helping at the admissions table or the GTAPA booth? 

Best-Selling Novel Book Review



When was the last time you saw a postage stamp on the cover of a best-selling novel? For me, it was several years ago with the release of mystery novel, The Chalon Heads by Barry Maitland. On the cover was an envelope with two Canadian imperforate 12 penny blacks (# 3 Scott's cat.) with a magnificent bull's-eye cancellation. Well, another best-seller, The Plot Against America, is Philip Roth's latest, it has one stamp on the cover and it's a dandy read! The book cover shows the one cent green Yosemite National Park stamp (USA, Scott # 740) with an overprinted Nazi swastika. Furthermore, stamps are an integral part of the story for the main character is a younger Roth growing up in New Jersey who believes stamps are the entry point to the larger world. The lad states early in the book that the approvals he received from

H. E. Harris & Co. were the only mail besides birthday cards that he remembered receiving. The book is classed as an alternative history based on real historical figures and happenings, but transforms the past to explore how history could have been different.

Perhaps your knowledge of history will include the 1940 re-election of Franklin Roosevelt. He defeated Charles Lindberg a great American hero, for the presidency, but this story has Lindberg as the winner. He quietly sides with Germany and Japan signing a non-aggression pact and slowly begins to target American Jews. Walter Winchell, Fiorello LaGaurdia and Henry Ford are all in it. The "what if this had happened?" scenarios keep the reader engaged. As things begin to unravel, in the historical context, so too does the young lad's stamp collection. Swastikas beginning to appear on his stamps and the mishaps with his stamps create nightmares. History buffs will thoroughly enjoy Roth's masterful telling of a story that could have happened, but didn't. The author knows philately and weaves a great deal of his collecting expertise into the text. David Cohen's review in Linn's a few months ago, mentions that collectors will surely see a bit of themselves as beginning collectors, in the young lad who is central to the story. This fact will endear the book to many in the hobby. It's a great read. Book stores have it and so do the public libraries. (Thanks to Cohen's review for assistance.) contributed by Peter Butler

The club has sufficient funds to be active but a rapidly declining membership. Last year the members were surveyed and decided to try a change in time, location and format. - Meetings are at Stan Wadlow Senior's Action Centre on Cedarvale Ave., (Woodbine & Cosburn area) on the first and third Tuesdays of the month, October to May, at 9:30 to 11 :00 a.m.
- The membership fee is \$5.00 yearly, payable to the Stan Wadlow Clubhouse for Seniors.
- Activities include stamp exchanges, a stamp dealer who buys and sells stamps, estate evaluations and disposals, stamp chats and fellowship.
- Full benefits at the centre are available to the members including: social events, bus trips, card playing and exercise classes.

The objective of the club is to provide a meeting place to enjoy the hobby. Stamp collecting is often

IN MEMORIAM Jim A. Hennok


As we finalize this issue of PhilaJournal, we note the passing of Jim Hennok. The following is taken from a notice in the Toronto Star, May 12, 2005.

HENNOK, Jim. A. - 67, passed away May 9, 2005, at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto. Born in Estonia, he came to Canada with his parents in 1949. They lived briefly in Rapides-des-Joachims, Quebec before settling in Toronto. Jim studied photography at school and then worked briefly for the Toronto Star before joining the RCAF as a photographer. He became an instructor at the Photography School in Camp Borden. While in the RCAF he was active in competitive shooting. Among his awards were Silver and Bronze Medals at the Pan American Games in smallbore rifle.

As a teenager, Jim took an interest in philately. He produced his first "List of Stamps for Sale" while still in high school. Today, more than 50 years later, the firm of Jim A. Hennok Ltd. still operates in Toronto as one of Canada's premier auction houses. Jim earned recognition as a National Philatelic Judge and served on the Vincent G. Greene Philatelic Research Foundation Expertizing Committee.


Czeslaw Slania (1921-2005)

Master stamp engraver Czeslaw Slania died on March 17 in Stockholm at the age of 83. Slania was born near Katowice, Poland and his first forays into the world of printing were in the form of helping prepare forged documents during the German Occupation of Poland during World War II. After graduating from the Krakow School of Fine Arts he began working for the Polish Government Printing Works and engraved his first Polish stamp in 1951. In 1956 he was able to leave Poland and settled in Sweden where several years later the Sweden Post hired him. His work was so highly thought of and respected that in 1972 he was appointed Royal Court Engraver of Sweden. Subsequently he received similar appointments from Denmark and Monaco. During his lifetime Slania did the engraving for more than 1000 stamps for over 32 postal administrations as well as the engraving for banknotes of 10 countries. Slania also did the engraving for highly collectable labels featuring amongst others the likenesses of movie stars, boxers and world leaders. Many Slania study groups and societies exist around the world. Ironically he passed away on March 17, five years to the day, after the Sweden Post Office issued his 1000th stamp!

THE WEST TORONTO STAMP CLUB A BRIEF HISTORY by Frank Alusio, FRPSC

The West Toronto Stamp Club traces its beginning to 1935 when a group of philatelic minded individuals met on 20 February in the home of Samuel Burford, at 782 Indian Road, for the purpose of establishing a stamp club in the Toronto west-end. Election of Officers protemp resulted in R. B. Lindsay being elected President; S. C. Burford, Secretary; and D. Campbell, Treasurer.

The first official meeting took place on 10 March 1935 in the Assembly Hall, 2875 Dundas Street West, near Keele Street in Toronto. The elections of the officers resulted in V.C. Chute being elected President; S.C. Burford, Secretary; N.W. Hill, Treasurer.

D. Henderson, R.B. Lindsay, and F.W. Reynolds were elected Directors. It is therefore without a doubt that these seven gentlemen are the founding members of West Toronto Stamp Club.

In the fall of the same year, the Secretary issued the following notice:

"Did ever a small club spring into existence and grow in membership and popularity with the rapidity experienced by WTSC, since its inauguration and without press advertising or publicity." The membership at the time numbered 20.

In the first year of operation, the Club established a fixed meeting place; drafted, read and adopted its own Constitution; a Bulletin was produced to communicate and promulgate news; a stamp exchange session was a feature at every meeting; stamp auctions were established and well attended; and the occasional guest speaker was invited to promote philately.

Towards the end of the first year, again Secretary Burford, in his periodical notice, wrote: "This will be our last meeting of the year and the Executive feel that the Club has justified its existence. If nothing else, that it has been instrumental in bringing together collectors from various parts of the city and from the various walks of life. We have become acquainted with each other and have formed friendships that in most cases will last through the coming years and probably long after the memory of this little club has faded into the dim past."

Throughout the years, the Club has enjoyed prosperity. The number of members who have been associated with the Club has now reached 974. Such prosperity can only be obtained through the enthusiasm and dedication of members such as: Bob Woolley, Cyril Woodhead (who concurrently held the presidency of WTSC and that of the Canadian Philatelic Society, now the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada), Bill Sparrow, Everett Drake (the longest to hold the Office of the President, 22 years, of which 21 were consecutive), Arnold Tuthill, Art Insley, Jim Webb and Frank Smith (who were all instrumental in organizing and conducting the auctions), Fred Charles (the longest to hold the Office of the Secretary, 14 consecutive years), Frank Alusio (the longest to hold the Office of the Treasurer, 31 consecutive years), and Keith Cain (the longest to hold the Office of Membership, 20 consecutive years).

Many of the activities in the past 70 years have centred on stamp auctions -Regular, Jumbo, Invitational, and the like; Annual Stamp Exhibitions among its membership and competing with other clubs; Inter-club visit exchange with other local as well as outof-town clubs such as Oshawa, Hamilton, Buffalo, and wherever the Canadian Philatelic Society met, the WTSC contingency was always there; well-known speakers have addressed the membership over time, namely: Fred Jarrett, the Dean of Canadian philately, Jim Sissons, Doug Patrick, Vincent Greene, Walter Bayley, L. M. Rathburn, Dr. G. M. Gelderd, L. M. Lamoroux, Dr. Earl S. Ball, Harry Sutherland, John H. Lowe and many others.

On 21 November 1939, WTSC became affiliated with the Canadian Philatelic Society and is currently chartered under the RPSC as Chapter 14.

The West Toronto Stamp Club's membership record lists illustrious philatelists. We find names such as: F. Jarrett, G. E. Davenport, Dr. R. Maresh, J. H. Lowe, Robert G. Lowe, Dr. C. M. Jephcott, Ken Rowe, Wm. H. Slate, Bill McCann, Frank Alusio, Garfield Portch, and many more. This proves how active and influential WTSC must have been to attract such well-known names in philately.

The West Toronto Stamp Club is currently an affiliate member of the Greater Toronto Area Philatelic Alliance, the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, and the American Philatelic Society.

President's Annual Report

From the beginning, the Alliance has stated its mission, our *raison d'etre*, to be the promotion of stamp collecting and the enhancement of the art of philately. In the three years the organization has existed, we have made an indelible mark on the Canadian philatelic scene and specifically on the member stamp clubs of the Greater Toronto Area. Many who are members of this great hobby of stamp collecting, in this heavily populated area of Southern Ontario, are aware of what exciting, innovative and dynamic programs this organization has created in the three years.

In that time, we have been praised for our work by writers in the Canadian Philatelist and the Canadian Stamp News. We have been instrumental in the creation and the ongoing work of Stakeholders in Philately (SIP), a national organization of all levels of organized stamp collecting, working collaboratively to support all levels of the hobby. Our newsletter, PhilaJournal, has quickly become a respected and progressive commentary on the activities of the nine member clubs and the hobby in general. The rejuvenation of STAMPEX in three years, to become a national show once again, is indicative of how hard work, innovative thinking and mutually beneficial partnerships can have a positive impact on the stamp collecting community. We believe STAMPEX has responded to the grassroots of the hobby by creating what it wants out of a stamp show.

And while all this has been happening, the Alliance has also spearheaded all kinds of initiatives amongst the member clubs. Who would have ever heard of Frank Alusio, Garfield Portch, John Wilson, Ingo Nessel and Art Halpert, to name just a few, prior to 2002? These, and others, have shared their expertise with other clubs beyond the influence of their own club, because the Alliance has facilitated their visits to other groups. The same is true for judges, making the rounds from club to club to assist regional and local shows with the judging of exhibits. The good word has spread!

The phenomenon of Ted's Tubs is another great example of the effectiveness of an Alliance initiative. The tubs have raised money for youth philately that never would have happened if West Toronto had simply made it an "at home" program. There are other examples from the sharing of a pool of exhibition frames to the sharing of club newsletters and circuit books, that could be mentioned. You get the picture.

With this success, is it now the time to sit back and rest on our laurels? The question is rhetorical. With all the accomplishments and the notoriety, it is still no time to slow down... there's much more that needs our attention. It is incumbent on me, as your president, to share some of my thoughts on what the future might hold for GTAPA. The number of clubs in the Alliance has grown from six to nine over the three years. It is my objective to continue to expand the membership and the influence of our organization to more clubs in the GTAPA. An outreach program especially to the east and north of the GTA is slowly beginning to take root. Invitations to our members to speak and lead workshops beyond the Toronto area, is a reality and will grow.

We have found that our expectations are well beyond the reality of serving youth and other beginners to the hobby. This needs more than just our attention; it needs volunteers to work with prospective collectors. A few initiatives have been discussed and some inroads have begun. I will announce some preliminary plans for these in the fall.

Lastly, but by no means of lesser importance, is a planned increase in collaboration with our colleagues to the west... the member clubs of the Grand River Valley Philatelic Association. We were invited to their Stamp Fair last year and we have been invited again this October. We have yet to identify a GTAPA project which we could create and return the invitations, but that will happen in the not-too-distant future. Rather than plan a similar event in Toronto in return, we have decided to do something different to offer our "western" colleagues. There is so much potential here for a growing partnership to promote the hobby and enhance philately.

It goes without saying that our expectations for the success of the national and international show that we are committed to organize, are high. Over the next few years the Toronto scene will become the most important centre in Canada for the hobby, and the GTAPA and its partners will be the organizations to do the job well.

If you and your club have strong feelings about what the Alliance could be doing to strengthen its influence and its activities, please attend a Board meeting or write us an e-mail and tell us. We are good listeners. We are activity-oriented and we are not intimidating. We have been appointed by you to respond to your club's wishes in a forum of mutual respect and collegiality. Your input is needed and will be respected.

The GTAPA is the most exciting thing I have done in my many years of stamp collecting and I am honoured and proud to be your leader. Thank you for this great opportunity to serve the clubs and collectors of Greater Toronto and beyond.

The Victoria Cross Garfield Portch

Following the recent issue of the stamps depicting the Victoria Cross, I decided to do some research into the recipients of this distinguished award who were born in Toronto.



DUNN, Alexander Roberts

Born in York, Upper Canada, September 15th, 1833 Unit: 11th (Prince Albert's Own) Regiment of (Light) Dragoons (Hussars), (British Army) The medal is at Upper Canada College.

During the Charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava, Lieutenant Alexander Dunn won the V.C. when, having emptied his revolver at the Russians he flung it at them and resorted to his sabre, which he used to such good effect that he saved Sergeant Bentley's life by cutting down several Russians who were attaching him.

Dunn Avenue is named for his father, John Henry Dunn who was a pioneer property owner in the area.

COCKBURN, Hampden Zane Churchill

Born in Toronto, November 19th, 1867 Unit: The Royal Canadian Dragoons The medal is at Upper Canada College.

During the South African War, Lieutenant Cockburn and two others won the V.C. in a gallant defence of the guns at Komati River. He and a small party formed the rearguard for the 84th Battery that was attacked by 200 mounted Boers who got within 70 yards of the guns before they were stopped. Lt. Cockburn and his party held the attackers at a critical moment and were deliberately sacrificed to allow the guns to get away. Cockburn was wounded and his entire party was either killed, wounded or taken prisoner.

HORNELL, David Ernest (posthumous) Born in Mimico, January 26th, 1910 Service: Royal Canadian Air Force The medal is at Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg (on loan from the family). On June 24, 1944, during the Battle of the Atlantic, Flight Lieutenant Hornell was the pilot of a twin-engine amphibian engaged in anti-submarine action near the Shetland Islands. After several hours on patrol, a surfaced submarine was sighted. Despite fierce and accurate anti-aircraft fire, Hornell dropped to low altitude and attacked with depth charges sinking the submarine. The aircraft had been hit several times, was on fire and had one engine fall off but Hornell was able to bring the airplane down on the heavy swell. There was not sufficient room in the single surviving dinghy for the entire crew so they took turns in the water holding to the sides. The crew was rescued after 21 hours but Hornell died shortly after being picked up.

Hornell Avenue and Hornell Public School in Etobicoke are both named in his honour.

TILSTON, Frederick Albert

Born in Toronto, June 11, 1906 Unit: The Essex Scottish Regiment The medal is at the Essex and Kent Regiment in Windsor

On March 1, 1945 at The Hochwald, Germany, Major Tilston won his V.C. leading his company in an attack over 500 yards of open ground. After being wounded in the head, he destroyed a machine gun position with a grenade. Approaching the woods, he was hit in the hip with shrapnel. He was hit in the other leg during close fighting, but his company held the ground. As medical assistance arrived, his only words were "We held."

TOPHAM, Frederick George

Born in Toronto, August 10th, 1917 Unit: 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion The medal is at the Canadian Forces Base Petawawa Museum.

Corporal Topham, a medical orderly, parachuted to a heavily defended area east of the Rhine. On March 24, 1945, he went forward to replace two orderlies who had been killed treating a casualty. As he worked on the wounded man, he was shot through the nose. He carried the wounded man through heavy fire back to the shelter of the woods then continued his duties for another two hours until all other casualties had been evacuated. Only then did he receive assistance for his own wound

"They shall not be forgotten."
