Insurance & Banking Honours Jim Bickford



On December 13, 2007 Mr. **James G. Bickford** was awarded an Honorary Life Membership in the Insurance and Banking Philatelic Society of Great Britain, Canadian Branch. He was awarded a framed scroll so attesting by the Club's President, Mr. **Joe Janthur**. The event took place in the premises of DEPAG Deposit Agency of Canada Inc., where the Club regularly meets.

Jim Bickford was born in the Eastern Townships of the Province of Quebec 79 years ago. His father was an avid stamp collector. When a young boy, Jim begged his father to allow him to help him mount stamps. But his father was not convinced. So Jim's mother bought Jim a stamp album of his own, into which, with the aid of LePage mucilage, Jim mounted his treasures. Later, Jim concentrated on the stamps of Canada and Newfoundland and has built up valuable collections.

As a member of the IBPS Jim solved many questions of procedure and administration with his wise advice with the help of his many years of senior executive experience in business. Jim served a lifetime in the former The Canadian Bank of Commerce, later amalgamated into the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, both in Canada and abroad. He was manager of the Bank's main branch in Kingston, Jamaica and of the large operations off Wall Street in New York.

From there Jim was appointed manager of the Bank's branch in London, England, where he served many years and built valuable relationships for the Bank in Canada, Europe, Africa and elsewhere.

Messages from the President

The ROYAL Financial Statement

For most readers of PhilaJournal, the words ROYAL*2007*ROYALE seldom come to mind. It's been several months since the event took place and whether you attended the show or not, it's history! For those who attended to purchase material for their collections, those items are now probably amid the older stamps and covers in your albums and the search for more material provides a new focus. For those who attended the opening ceremonies, the seminars or workshops, the exhibition, the reception and the banquet or the judge's critique, the memories are still vivid in our minds and form a clear remembrance of a great show. But, that was four months ago and in the day-to-day activities of your involvement in the hobby, the ROYAL has become a distant or fading memory albeit the best stamp show Toronto has seen in over a decade.

For a handful of us in the GTAPA, the experiences of the ROYAL have, until very recently, continued to be on our minds, the subject in our e-mails and the topic of many discussions and debates at several meetings of the Board of Directors and of the ROYAL Planning Team. At the January Director's Meeting, the Financial Statement was finally approved. It was announced that all bills had been received and paid in full and that the required documents for distribution to all our stakeholders would be prepared and sent out. This Messages from the President is one of my final responsibilities as Chair of the Planning Team to report to the members of the GTAPA clubs, the results of our budgetary efforts and the decisions made regarding future plans.

It was remarkable that the Budget created by **Ernie Nyitrai**, prior to the show, was very close to the actual outcome in terms of income and expenses:

- In terms of the anticipated income from: advertising, exhibitor's fees, sales of covers and cards, entrance fees, banquet and reception ticket sales and donations and grants, the anticipated budget was within \$200.00 of the actual income received. The anticipated income was \$24,400.00 while actual income was \$24,208.50
- · In terms of the anticipated expenses of: giving half of the entrance fees collected to the CSDA (previous agreement of the partnership with CSDA), extra tables and chairs required for seminars, society meetings, Society Row and RPSC meetings, program and palmares printing, commemorative cover costs, exhibition expanses (medals, ribbons, certificates, transportation of frames, prizes, judges' expenses, mailings and photocopying, bussing of children, banquet and reception charges and many small miscellaneous costs (e.g. volunteer parking fees, signage and sandwich boards), the anticipated

expense was \$24,470.00 while actual expenses were \$20,712.13.

- The cost of the premises, furnishings and security was assumed by the CSDA.
- The balance, considering income and expenses, created a profit of \$3,496.37.
- The Board approved the final statement and also reached consensus on giving a donation of \$500.00 to The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. (See below)

For a complete account of the GTAPA's ROYAL Financial Report of January 23, 2008, please see your club president for a copy of the approved document.

The donation of \$500.00 to The RPSC had originally been voted on unanimously at the Planning Team's final meeting as a donation of \$1000.00. The Executive Committee had also approved this. These decisions, however, were made prior to the final profit being calculated. With final figures in and a substantial bill still unpaid, the Directors realized that the initial amount represented a third of the final profit figure. In light of this, the Board decided \$500.00 would be a more realistic donation, representing nearly 15% of the profit.

It was recognized that the "title" ROYAL adds substantially to the interest within the hobby, to the number of exhibits entered and the overall attendance figures. For GTAPA, this translated into more income than usual from various sources. And while this fact also increased expenses, the overall profit expected was higher than a regular stamp show.

We were also aware that at The RPSC Director's Meeting held during the show, a motion had been approved that a request be sent to all future ROYAL planning committee chairmen that consideration be given to donating a percentage of their show's profit to The RPSC as joint hosts of the event. (The rationale for this request was the same as mentioned above as to why the GTAPA wished to make a donation.) Since our Board is an affiliate of The RPSC and very supportive of our national association, we wanted to be the first planning committee to honour this request.

The GTAPA's Financial Report.

At the January meeting, the Board also approved the GTAPA's Financial Statement (Annual Report for '06-'07) for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2007. Although an official audit is not required for our kind of organization, Treasurer Joe Janthur has always insisted that someone qualified to inspect the books be appointed each year to go through the records and produce a report to the Board. This year, Steve Haddock from the East Toronto Stamp Club was assigned to carry out that responsibility. The job was done through November and December and Steve's report was presented at the January meeting. Joe's work as the treasurer was found to be exemplary, all

figures balanced for the year, all cheques were accounted for, expenses paid and the bank accounts were accurate. Thanks and appreciation were extended to Steve Haddock and Joe Janthur. In Joe's inimitable way, he finished his report with," All bills have been paid, there are no outstanding debts and there's money in the bank. We are in the black, we are solvent, we owe nothing!"

GTAPA's Planning Committee – tired but positive!

In the final paragraph of the ROYAL's Financial Report above, I mentioned our pride and our accomplishments in holding five major philatelic shows in as many years. I have no recollections of any organization in recent stamp show history taking on such a heavy responsibility and providing so much for the stamp collecting community over such a short time period. The Planning Team, for the time being, is finished with its commitment to that kind of a schedule. It was a commitment of time and energy that we made five years ago, not knowing what we were really getting into.

At that time, **Frank Alusio** was the only member of the team who had had any experience in organizing stamp shows. After the early planning, he was not able to continue with us. The rest of the team learned quickly! We made mistakes but we instituted several innovations to exhibiting and provided show goers with much more than the traditional philatelic exhibition and program.

Two of our shows put us in the red, two more broke even and our last effort produced a modest profit. The original GTAPA commitment is now over and the planning team has disbanded. We have not been able to enlist younger members to our group and while we have always had a great response from club members as volunteers at show times, it is in the search for the positions of managers, responsible for one of ten portfolios, that has been unsuccessful.

As one member has often said, "I just want to show up at a stamp show for a day or two and be a greeter at the front door! I want to chat with friends and colleagues and tour the dealer booths and the exhibition on my own time. That's what I want to do."

We have decided that there will be no STAMPEX in October of 2008. After the wrap-up of the ROYAL, this decision was made and passed on to key members of the philatelic community. (STAMPEX, you will recall, is the name of a national show in Toronto that was given to the GTAPA to use at the discretion of The RPSC, who owns the rights to the name.) The CSDA has had the Queen Elizabeth Building booked for some time and will continue with an October show.

Over the next several months, the GTAPA Board will discuss new possibilities for a Planning Team, possible locations for future regional/local stamp shows and

what the priorities of a GTAPA sponsored stamp show would look like. As you know, we have often incorporated new ideas on how a stamp show might be better organized to better meet the needs of the GTA stamp community.

In closing, I wish to state that the planning team realized it is not, "the only act in town." If other organizations come forward to carry the torch, we would be supportive. That would not deter us from continuing with our efforts to create something new. We all agree that now it is time to return to our basic set of values as stated in our constitution, work for the betterment of our member clubs and focus on their expressed needs and wishes. Some of us believe that we have, to some extent, neglected these expectations. So it's back to work on other initiatives.

If any of our member clubs or individuals from those clubs would like to invite any executive members of the Board to explain these points in greater detail at a club meeting, please contact me to discuss the possibilities. We would be happy to oblige. And as always, I would be pleased to attend your club meetings to discuss and explain any GTAPA business that arises from club discussions.

In the meantime, I'm going to spend an inordinate amount of time on my stamps. They have been sadly neglected and are screaming for some attention!








A Farewell To Ron Zelonka

Leafing through my trident album with each stamp in its place, I come to realize how much I will miss the greatest über-collector of tridents, our own Ron Zelonka. Dr. Ronald A. Zelonka passed away peacefully with his family at his side on Friday, October 26, 2007. This tragic and untimely loss to the international Ukrainian philatelic community will be felt far and wide. Ron was a long time member of UPNS #334, the Ukrainian Collectibles Society (Toronto), and known to many collectors and dealers from every continent.



Ron was a quiet man with many friends ranging from fellow university graduates, his work colleagues, and his Ukrainian stamp collecting friends. Ron graduated from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario with a Science degree in 1969 and a PhD in Chemistry in 1972. He recently retired as Vice-President, Technology and Innovation, DuPont Canada Inc. where he pursued his passion for science and innovation, aimed at improving people's lives, not only in Canada, but globally.

Ron brought the disciplines he lived with in everyday life, his family, and his career to collecting. His interests in Ukrainian collectibles covered many areas: trident overprints, Western Ukraine, medals, postcards, paper money, DP postage, postal history, as well as, Star Trek figurines. Of all his collecting passions, he is best known for his love of the trident overprint and medals. His expertise in tridents was eagerly sought after and he was more than willing to share his in-depth knowledge and encouraged his fellow philatelists to discover this specialized area. Few have had the privilege to admire his fabulous collection and be overcome with the feeling that they were looking at something one of a kind.

Ron's wife Pat fondly remembers the day in the early 70's when Ron decided to sell part of his BNA stamp collection to purchase some fieldpostcards for \$300, a princely sum for those days, especially for newlyweds. This was Ron's introduction to Ukrainian philately. He reasoned naively that for a country like Ukraine, with such a brief history of independence in 1918-20, it would be possible to acquire one of everything that was ever issued or mailed. Ron continued his lifelong quest to find that one rare overprint or that elusive cover that no one had ever seen before.

In 2006, Ron's philatelic interests cumulated in accreditation as UPNS Expertiser of Trident Overprints. He was a contributor to the *Ukrainian Philatelist Journal*. Whenever his busy schedule permitted, he attended the Society's annual Zustriches. At UKRAINPEX 2007 Ron and his son Ben won Gold for their *Military Operations in Western Ukraine 1914-1920* exhibit, the last of many medals won in philatelic exhibitions. Everything Ron did was driven by his personal goals, his pursuit of excellence. He expected nothing less from his friends who on many occasions were persuaded to take that difficult extra step towards self improvement.

We will miss Ron at our Monday club meetings. As well, we will miss him as Exhibition Chairman for our UKRAINPEX exhibitions, his albums of trading material, his laugh, his sense of humor. And I will miss Ron and the occasional visit to his home to talk shop. I got my first introduction to Ukrainian philately at CAPEX 1986 by unknowingly purchasing from a dealer a number of Ron's stock books. Many a stamp in my trident album is from those stock books. Ron, May the Tridents Always be with you!

Registration Errors

Whilst rummaging through a dealer's stock at a local bourse this little unusual item came to light, and it was purchased purely for its curiosity value.

Just image the trouble of taking a postcard to the post office, going through the registration procedure, paying the rate demanded by the clerk (otherwise they would not accept it), only for the recipient to be charged for postage due. This implies that both the accepting post office clerk and the staff in the delivery office were not doing their job and were unaware of the postal regulations that were current at the time.

Ormstown

Ormstown is located across the St Lawrence River and southwest of Montreal in Quebec. It is obvious from the address that, even in 1960, Ormstown was not a highly populated area; otherwise the address would have included much more detail such as a house number and street name.

According to the 2001 census, Ormstown had a total population of 3,647. The Ormstown post office was opened in 1839 and situated in Durham village, later to be renamed Ormstown village. Ormstown also had a railway post office that operated between 1899 and 1961.

Postcard

This address side of the postcard reads: Mr. Earl E. Sault, Ormstown, Quebec

Even though the message has been erased, some words are still readable and these are:

Dear Earl,

Carl Wanger Guelph Patolio

As can be construed both the sender and addressee (Carl and Earl) knew each other very well, otherwise the salutation would have been 'Dear Mr. Sault' instead of

'Dear Earl'. Apart from the salutation and the valediction, the main part of the message has been erased, but the word 'within' is just decipherable at the beginning of the second line. The word 'within' normally signifies that the addressee owed the sender money, and the sender would like the matter to be resolved as quickly as possible before legal action is used to recover the debt. In this case the registration service was used to act as proof of delivery.

Postage

The postal rates for 1960 state that the regular postage for a postcard was 4ϕ , while the registration fee was an additional 20ϕ (24ϕ total).

When this card was produced and sold by the post office the postage rate was correct for the year 1890, but the post office clerk made no attempt to update the postage to the correct current rate for 1960. This postal stationery card had the imprint of a 1ϕ stamp from the Jubilee set. Although this stamp was 70 years old, it was (and still is) valid for part payment of postage. The additional stamp used to pay the cost of the registration was a 20ϕ 'Pulp and Paper Industry' stamp that was issued in 1956.

Both of the stamps used on this postcard have been cancelled by a Guelph barrel cancel dated 10th May 1960, with the added indication that it was accepted for entry into the postal system at 10:00am. This cancellation indicates that the clerk at the Guelph post office was happy that both the postage and registration fee had been paid in full.

At the lower left can be seen the purple registration etiquette handstamp that had been applied by the Guelph post office with a manuscript '107' inserted into the appropriate position. At the upper left is the purple registered transit mark of Montreal.

When this postcard reached the delivery office in Ormstown a receiving mark was applied, which can be seen on the left portion of the 'Jubilee' stamp, and dated 11th May 1960. A clerk at the Ormstown office noticed that the postage rate had been underpaid by 3ϕ . This clerk affixed two postage due stamps that totalled 6ϕ (double deficiency), and duly tied them to the post card by the Ormstown receiving mark. Unfortunately, the clerk had applied postage due stamps that equalled double deficiency (6ϕ) instead of the single deficiency rate (3ϕ) that was to be applied on items that were registered. These postage dues were a 5ϕ and a 1ϕ . As can be appreciated both the post office clerk and the delivery office clerk were both wrong in their decisions.

Conclusion

It is unusual for confidential information such as contained in this message to be written on a postcard for all and sundry to read en route to the addressee. It would have been more courteous if the sender had enclosed the message within a sealed envelope, thus enabling the contents to be kept both private and confidential from everyone except the recipient, and then sent via registered post.

If this postcard had been posted, with the same stamps affixed, in a post box then it would have been treated as a simple overpayment of postage and not undergo the registration operation. Should this situation had arisen it would have been very unlikely that the post office would have made any attempt to reimburse the excess postage to the sender.

This example is proof that registered postcards do exist, even though they are very elusive items, to find one complete with Postage Due stamps is extremely rare and virtually unknown.



Chicagopex 2007 – The Pan-Slavic Show

This year's Chicagopex, the 121st edition, took place from 16-18 November in Arlington Heights, a suburb just north and west of Chicago. It was hosted in the beautiful Sheraton Hotel by a veteran crew led by Larry Kobelt of the Chicago Philatelic Society and Chair Alfred Kugel, former Ukrainian Philatelic and Numismatic Society (UPNS) member.

You will note from the commemorative cover above, the show theme that 'Honors Slavic Nobel Scientists'. Though not strictly limited as such, the show emphasized pan-Slavic cultural themes. Ukrainian, Czechoslovak, Polish, and Russian presentations were joined by closely related fields including Austria and Hungary, as well as nebulously related areas, Bulgaria, Serbia, and the former Yugoslavia. There were 332 frames, including 92 Polish, 50 Russian, 34 Czechoslovakian, 28 Ukrainian, and 11 Hungarian.

As various UPNS members drifted in from the nether-regions of our planet and settled into our hotel rooms to join our local members, we began to realize what a wonderful time we were about to have, not only due to the wealth of exhibits, but also due to the camaraderie of friendship, new colleagues, and rekindled relationships that we were about to share. UPNS's most recent event, which occurred this past June during Ukrainpex-2007 in Toronto, seemed just like yesterday as we settled in with our fellow colleagues for a cup of tea or two! This was required medicine, as yours truly and co-pilot Jerry Kalyn spent a few more hours on the road than necessary, when we got lost just after crossing the border.

On Friday, we met at the Sheraton and set up our display table. The night prior, our UPNS exhibitors had done their thing setting up frames in the Great Lakes Ballroom. Perusing a few of the vendors in the Arlington Ballroom's bourse and in the hallways

eventually took us to the Czechoslovak table, where a new Carpatho-Ukraine book in English was being sold.

Titled Carpatho-Ukraine Postal History and Stamps 1786-2000 and compiled by Ing. J. Verleg of Netherlands, this book had just recently been released! The 228-page volume synthesizes a tremendous amount of C-U research and is beautifully illustrated and in color, with excellent examples of stamps and covers, and a timeline of coverage that lends further knowledge to this field.

We next had a chance to check out the exhibits once the ballroom opened. In order, awards included Gold, Vermeil, Silver, Silver-Bronze, and Bronze. To suggest that I was in awe over those exhibits that related directly to Ukraine is, quite frankly, an understatement.

Western Ukraine: Austrian Empire and ZUNR

Current UPNS President **Ingert Kuzych** displayed two exhibits, "The Definitives of the Ukrainian National Republic, 1918-1920 (and Their Derivative Issues)" and "Lemberg: The Postal History of an Imperial Austrian Crownland Capital". While the latter 6-frame exhibit was part of the "Court of Honor" and thus not up for judging, the former 1-frame exhibit, which includes one of the rarest of all Ukrainian stamps, the Courier Field Post 40-hryven/20-hryven of which only one-on-cover and one mint are known (despite various source materials stating a total of 15), received a Vermeil. While we had recently seen this same exhibit of stamps and covers in Toronto in June, it is always a distinct privilege to view such rarities, in particular those that are maintained by UPNS members!

Western Ukraine: Podilia

Former UPNS President **Bohdan Pauk**'s exhibit was titled "Ukraine 1918 - Podilia Province", and this 4-

framer which featured select covers, was awarded a Bronze. Like a few others, Pauk was unable to attend



the Toronto Ukrainpex-2007, and so it was nice to have this opportunity to meet him.

Carpatho-Ukraine



Two exhibits, one by **Jay Carrigan** and the other by **Tønnes Ore**, both UPNS members, included outstanding displays of high-end and, by and large, very rare stamps and covers.

Because of the several articles he has written, many UPNS members are well aware of Carrigan's expertise in this field, which without any question whatsoever was matched by his 9-frame exhibit! Titled "Carpatho-Ukraine 1944 to 1945", the simplicity of the exhibit's layout lent ease of comprehension to a field that is otherwise quite complex due to the many available varieties. With its outstanding content, which included stamps and covers, it was awarded a Gold.



Ore's exhibit included a chronological display of stampless and stamped covers, which ranged from very rare to extremely rare. It was wonderful that our member and colleague from Norway was able to personally participate at Chicagopex. Ore's 8-frame exhibit received a Vermeil.



Other Ukraine-Related Exhibits

Two other exhibits of prominence showed material that can directly be attributed to Ukraine, even though they were thematically titled otherwise.

A 10-frame exhibit titled "Ostarbeiter Mail in World War Two", compiled by **George Werbizky**, featured covers and ephemera of war prisoners and victims, which included many such items from Ukrainian slave laborers, many of whom were just teenagers. The resolve, desperation and plight of these WW2 victims, was certainly noticeable in any photography that accompanied the various material.

Additionally, another 10-frame exhibit by former UPNS member and Chicagopex chair **Art Kugel** was included in the Court of Honor. Titled "The Philatelic Effects of the Breakup of the Romanov Empire 1918-1923", it incorporated various selections of Ukrainian stamps and covers amongst its displayed items.

Part of the fun at the show included the shared learning experience. Each exhibit fulfilled this role by including detailed information describing the inherent significance and meaning of each item to the given topic. Of the 332 total frames, the following award totals were completed: 21 Gold (plus 5 honorary Golds to the five invited Court of Honor exhibitors), 10 Vermeil, 6 Silver, 2 Silver-Bronze, and 3 Bronze. Thus, it can most accurately be stated that if an exhibit received any level of the 47 total awards, the exhibit must have been outstanding to begin with!

Darned, That Traffic!

As it turned out, many UPNSers were booked into a hotel located just across the street from a breakfast chain restaurant. This venue turned out to be ideal for our daily planning.

After Saturday's show finished at 6pm, several of us went back to our hotels, in order to meet up and head off for a traditional Ukrainian dinner, and a cup of tea or two, in Chicago's "Ukrainian Village".

Alas, however, Hwy 90, which runs through Chicago, was a nightmare. We traveled seven miles in two hours, and so two of our three cars decided to peel off

and go back to a Greek restaurant just across the street from our hotel. The return trip for the same distance took only 10 minutes by foot!

Unfortunately, we had to hope the lead car did this as well, but we didn't know for sure as they were out of sight. As it turned out, our Detroit contingent managed to get to the Village as they had a toll-gate pass, making matters faster for them.

Sunday

On the last day, some of us found our minds drifting off into thoughts about the trip home. For the Toronto contingent, what should have been an 8½ hour drive into Chicago, turned to be over 10 hours due both to getting lost and to getting caught up in Chicago's evening rush hour.



After saying our good-byes to all, **Jerry Kalyn** and I headed off into the sunset for our journey back to Toronto. We ran into some heavy traffic at Hwy 69, which held us up a bit. However we managed to get home just before midnight, bringing an end to our festive philatelic weekend.

ETHIOPIAN REFUGEES AND THE WALDA REFUGEE CAMP

Kenya has been in the news recently because of the tribal violence that has claimed more than 1,000 lives since a disputed election in December. Fighting erupted between the majority Kikuyu supporters of Mr. Kibaki and the mainly Luo and Luhyha supporters of Mr. Odinga. Thankfully, a power-sharing agreement is in the offing, through the mediation efforts of former UN secretary-general Kofi Annan.

Given its geographical location and the political stability it had established until the current troubles, the Kenyan government and the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) have established refugee camps in the country for the past thirty years. Unfortunately, these are located "in some of the most inhospitable desert areas [...]. The camps are notorious for their extreme heat, lack of vegetation, scorpion infestation, and proximity to Kenya's borders with Somalia and Sudan." ¹



Above is a 1991 air-mail cover from the Walda refugee camp by Tamrat W. Mehdin, sent in care of the UNHCR in Nairobi, Kenya. It was sent to the Voice of America radio station in Washington. The UNHCR sets up postal services by field staff in the camps it operates.² The Voice of America's show "Africa Journal," besides offering current affairs programming, also broadcasts information about and to refugees in Africa.³ The cover, with very weak Nairobi cancels,

bears a 1.50 shilling butterfly stamp from 1988-90, one 8.50 shilling and two 2 shilling AIDS awareness stamps issued October 31, 1991, which suggests that it was mailed sometime in late 1991 or early 1992.

Approximately 80,000 Ethiopian refugees were living in Kenya by December, 1992; 140,000 had sought refuge in Sudan and about 4,000 in Djibouti. They had fled a bloody and protracted civil war between the Eritrean and Oromo provinces and the government in Addis Ababa. In 1991, Walda was one of four refugee camps - besides Ifo, Dagahaley, and Hagadera - located in Kenya's remote eastern zone near the Somali border. Over 80,000 refugees from different parts of Africa were crowded within Walda alone.

Yilma Tafere Tasew described life in the camp as a nightmare. For the first six months after his arrival there in 1991, there was no water in the camp for the refugees; later, a water tank was organized by the Kenyan government for the local nomads and cattle, but camp members were "only allowed to take the water left after the cattle had gone first." Besides typhoid, malaria and malnutrition, which had killed about 3,700 people (mostly women and children), camp refugees also had to face raids by armed bands. It was closed in March 1993 and the refugees where then moved to Kakuma. §

By December 1992, the BBC reported that approximately 50,000 of the refugees living in Kenya had registered for eventual repatriation to Ethiopia.⁷



An Interesting Toronto Cover Garfield Portch



A Toronto handstruck "STEAM BOAT" cover

This letter originated at Niagara on June 5th, 1841 and was delivered on board a cross-lake steam boat, likely the TRANSIT. Arriving at Toronto the same day, it was struck in black with the arched STEAM BOAT hand stamp and rated 41/2 pence postage due.

The cross-lake postage charge was 4½ pence which was the regular charge for a letter traveling 60 miles or less. The lake crossing from Niagara to Toronto is about 30 miles. If the letter had traveled the longer land route, it would have been about 60 miles and would have been rated 7 pence collect.

Here is a cover of great interest to all of the York & Halton County collectors. Mailed from Colchester England on July 24 1846 and addressed to: Mr. William James Dickson, care of Mr. George Burnett of the City Council, Toronto Upper Canada.

Care of the 4-time Mayor of Toronto- 1837,1848-50 and the Founder of the York "Courier of Upper Canada".

Paid "KJ 25 JY 25 1846" applied at London and "L JY 25 H" applied at Liverpool. Received at "Toronto AU 24 1846 UC". This was sent per Cunard Steamer "Caledonia" on her 29th voyage leaving Liverpool on August 4 arriving in Boston on August 18 1846. This was sent via closed bag mail from Liverpool to Montreal via Boston so no US receivers would be on the back.



Rated 1/2 sterling-1/4 currency and prepaid 1/0 British internal, packet and US transit and marked "MORE TO PAY 2" the colonial portion at Liverpool.

At Montreal the " $2\frac{1}{2}$ Currency" handstamp (Arnell type B-6) was applied, that being the conversion of the "more to pay 2" to Canadian currency.

At Toronto this was redirected to Trafalgar and charged an additional $2\frac{1}{2}$ pence redirection fee for a total of 5 pence currency.

Mr. George Burnett (1792-1861) was the founder of the *York Courier of Upper Canada* newspaper 1829-1837, Mayor of Toronto 1837,1848-50 and Police Magistrate of Toronto in 1851.



The Motors must have been a great company to work for back in those days, as David gave Jim a vote of confidence as a Supervisor, saying Jim was a very fair and warm boss. Funny how they all speak kindly of each other — must be the common interest of Stamp Collecting.

Did you know.....

The cleaning and re-use of stamps was prevented by the United States (1868-71) by embossing a grilled pattern of tiny squares. This broke the fibres on the surface of the paper allowing the canceling ink to penetrate more thoroughly and making cleaning more difficult.
