Clippings & Commentary

There are two stories connected to the clipping below, both concerning one of Canada's great icons who bridged the 19th and 20th centuries with major accomplishments in several fields of endeavour. His name is Sanford Fleming and philatelists will know him as the designer of Canada's first postage stamp, the famous three penny "Beaver" of 1851. Historians of Canada's great western expansion and enthusiasts of railroad construction generally, will know him as the key figure in every facet of the growth and development of our rail system, east to west.





"Breakfasted at Eliah's Hotel with Mr. Rutten and the Honorable Jas. Morris, Postmaster General, designing postage stamps for him." This was the entry in Fleming's diary for February 24, 1851.

What is perhaps less well-known is the fact that Fleming, at the invitation of the Postmaster General had submitted two designs, one for the three penny and one for the twelve penny denomination stamps. Both designs incorporated the beaver in the design, from which lithographic plates would be produced. Essays were then printed in small numbers on thin yellowish paper. Soon after, however, the twelve penny design was scrapped, not only on the grounds that the same design on the two stamps might lead to confusion but because the higher value stamp was for overseas mail. The design was considered less appropriate than an image of Queen Victoria on stamps travelling from the colony to England.

At no time did the postal authorities consider printing the stamps in lithography, a crude method at best in those days and one which lent itself to forgery quite easily. As early as 1849, the Legislative Assembly had authorized that production of stamps should be by engraving. At that time, no printer in Canada had the technology to produce engraved stamps so, reluctantly, the Postmaster General turned to the United States and awarded Messrs Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson of New York the contract to produce the stamps.

(Later, RWH&E would become the American Bank Note Company while being the printing contractor for the United States Post Office.) The fact that Canadian stamps were being printed in the United States did not sit well with many Canadians and it did become a political issue. Concerns about quality control and the selection of paper, "laid" paper vs. wove paper, were often raised and debated in the Legislature.

The three penny beaver stamp, however, remained in use for 17 years, apart from the change to 5 cents in 1859 when Canada changed to the decimal system. This alone would vindicate Fleming from any of the problems that were created by the US involvement and remains one of his greatest memorials to this day. To philatelists, it is ironic that the stamp design story was the least of his many achievements. But that's for another column!

The second story comes from a reading of an article written in the July 1951 issue of The Canadian Philatelist, that announced the mounting of a plaque by the Canadian Philatelic Society, in the main entrance of the Canada Trust Building at 110 Yonge Street in Toronto. The occasion was the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the issue of the three penny beaver stamp on April 23rd, 1851. (The plaque was actually unveiled on September 26th, during CAPEX '51. The cost of the plaque and its mounting was defrayed by individual contributors and stamp club donations.) The Canada Trust Building was on the very site of a twostorey building that had originally housed Sanford Fleming's drafting and surveying office, on the 2nd floor, where he had worked on the designs of the beaver stamps.



After reading this piece, I began to wonder if the plaque might still be there and, more to the point, was the building still there. I decided that on my next excursion downtown, I would take a few minutes to investigate 110 Yonge Street. I did have a small B&W picture of the Canada Trust Building as it looked in 1951, (illustrated nearby) from an advertisement in the CAPEX program.

As I had thought, the building had long since been destroyed but in its place, a new Canada Trust Building

had been constructed in 1967. Was the plaque still there?

Sure enough, walking up Yonge Street and coming to a stop in front of the building at 110 at the corner of Yonge and Adelaide Streets, with a TD Canada Trust Bank on the main floor, there it was for all passers by to see.

I was told by the receptionist, inside the building entrance, that the plaque is a very popular destination for many groups throughout the year participating on Scavenger Hunts. "Why's that?" I asked. She told me that a favourite question on their lists is, "What's the date of issue of Canada's first postage stamp? (Look around Yonge & Adelaide.)"

The receptionist also mentioned that there was an Archives Room on the 17th floor that I could visit, if the archivist was there. She was, and I had a brief tour of the "museum," the bookshelves and viewed the many portraits of bankers and other significant people in the history of the Toronto banking community.

Unfortunately, there were no other pictures of the earlier buildings, of Sandford Fleming or his office.

The whole experience was a pleasant surprise. I felt good about the fact that the plaque had been retained from the wreckage of the old building in 1967 and remounted on a marble panel street side on the new building, for all to see. How many times had I walked past the plaque and never noticed it or stopped to read it?

On arriving home, I happened to pick up the latest issue of *Canadian Stamp News* from the mailbox. There on the cover was the image of a magnificent cover from a Charles Firby Auction catalogue. (shown below) Imagine, five # 1's, not quite enough postage to get the letter to England via a steamer out of Québec City mind you, but a magnificent philatelic item to be treasured by some lucky collector!



I wondered if the price realized from the sale of this cover in today's world would have been sufficient funds to have paid for the construction of the first Canada Trust Building which followed the small building where the designer of the stamp went to work each day, to map railroad routes, design bridges and track lines and hire thousands of men to build the railroads. Oh, and design a few stamps of legendary significance to our fledgling country, during his coffee breaks!

Next time you are strolling on Yonge Street, stop at number 110 and soak up a little bit of Canadian history... and postal history too. Imagine a Canadian icon, our first stamp, four different buildings and a plaque tying it all together. It will do your soul good!

A Cover for the Recycle Bin?

On the surface, this is a pretty scruffy cover bearing a seriously mixed franking of stamps some of which are damaged. Let us, however, take a closer look.

The cover was mailed at Hannover on June 22nd, 1948 at 1100 hours to the city of Rosswein. It is franked with six different stamps from two series with a total of RM 2,40. Most of the stamps are damaged and not attractive to the eye. The postage of RM 2,40 is ten times the domestic rate of DM 0,24.

The currency reform in Germany took place at 0 hrs on June 21st, 1948. On this day every citizen could exchange 40 RM for 40 DM cash. All other cash in RM denomination was worthless except change up to 1 RM which was accepted at 10% of its value. Money held in bank accounts was also devalued but could only be withdrawn in small amounts at monthly intervals as decreed by the Government. Cash was tight in the new currency.

The use of the old RM stamps at a tenth of their face value was only possible until the first emptying of the mail box on June 23rd.

Now to the condition of the stamps: Small change and coins were taken out of circulation by hoarders, but stamps were generally accepted in their place. These stamps were not treated gently, but wound up being carried in pockets and purses. Here, the mailer of the letter simply used whatever stamps he held on hand.

For me, this letter is part of history and deserves a place of honour in my collection.

Gerry Quidzinski is Vice-President of the West Toronto Stamp Club and is an avid collector of German postal history during the inflation and post war periods.

How I Got My "Bluenose"



This stamp was the first significant trade of my "career" as a stamp collector. 

Thus, the stamp has some unusual memories and remains in my collection.



Unusual Postage Stamps

Following Switzerland's use of a thin veneer of wood in the creation of a postage stamp, Portugal issued a stamp printed on a very thin slice of cork. The 1 euro stamp issued in late 2007 shows an image of a cork tree. Portugal is the source of over one third of the worlds cork supply.




A September 2002 issue from Gibraltar not only showed 4 views of the famous Rock of Gibraltar but also allowed collectors to have some of the rock. Finely ground pieces of the rock were applied to certain portions of the design to create a textured effect.

Austria Post used a similar technique in 2006 when it issued a stamp showing a meteor streaking towards the earth. This time "cosmic dust" pulverized from a piece of a meteorite that had been found in Morocco was sprinkled onto the stamps. Each stamp is said to have 0.03 grams of the dust which had been mixed with a specially developed adhesive.



How eBay Fuels The Collecting Passion

Liz Hisey is the treasurer of a newly formed society, WE (Women Exhibitors) and is the secretary of the AAPE (American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors). This article is reprinted from the July issue of WE's electronic newsletter. Permission to do so was granted by the editor Barbara Harrison and the contributor Liz Hisey. Changes to the text are bracketed and are the responsibility of Peter Butler who believes this article will be very helpful to GTAPA members contemplating the eBay world.

With the cost of travel skyrocketing, traveling to stamp shows other than those that are local is becoming expensive, and most of us would rather spend the money on our collections rather than support the oil industry. So I would like to talk to you about eBay. For some of you this may be preaching to the choir, for others I hope this will encourage you to use eBay and other auctions to add to your collections.

Living in Florida with only one <code>[national]</code> show and very few local shows, accumulating material for my exhibits was difficult. In 2000 I became a member of eBay and have never regretted the decision. I have made over 2000 purchases, and I can count on one hand the bad transactions that have occurred.

One of the great things about eBay is that you can put in "searches" for specific stamps, covers, subjects, items — you name it, you can find it there. For me, the best part of the "search" (although I do like looking through the boxes of covers at shows) is that I can specify exactly what I want and the eBay computers will do the searching. In my case, I have been looking for single ingredients on stamps. Going up to a dealer and asking for say 'chickens' on stamps garnered a raised eyebrow and the question "which country?" As I had not spent hours pouring over the Scott catalogues, I was unable to answer. On the other hand, type 'chickens' into the "searches" section of eBay and lo and behold up comes 15-20 items, some days more, some days less.

First, to become a member (www.ebay.com) is a very easy process. You need to come up with a username and a password, enter them, and you are ready to go. When you enter the site, there is a box, "My eBay," which you hit, and up comes a box for you to enter your username and password. Fill this in (you can also tell your computer to save this information so that you do not need to enter it each time), hit the "sign in" button, and there is your summary page. Next hit the "help" button in the upper right hand corner, and it will bring up the tutorials. It is much easier for you to go through these than for me to take you through the process with just words. These tutorials are straightforward and do not take a lot of time or require us to be rocket scientists, but they are very worth while. When you have finished the tutorials you are all set to go. The most important links and really the only ones you need to concern yourselves with are: Watching, Bidding, Messages, Didn't Win, Searches and Feedback. I will take you through each.

Watching: This is what it sounds like, a list of all that you are keeping an eye on. This also gives you a chance to think if you really want this item, and if so then you bid. Delete items as they close.

Bidding: In the tutorial they will have explained how to bid. Make sure you know what you are bidding on; do some research. (See below – Searches.) Be wary of the amount you bid, up to \$25.00 you can put in odd amounts (I usually put in something like \$7.66 or \$12.66). After \$25.00 the bidding goes up in increments of \$1.00 so you need to put in amount plus .01. There is also another site called Esnipe.com, but that is another article!! Also keep an eye on shipping and handling. These can sometimes be way off. If you pay 99¢ for an item and the s/h is \$3.00 you might want to reconsider.

Won: Well, pretty obvious. The tutorial will have told you what to do. I would seriously suggest you become a member of Paypal. There is a direct link from eBay to Paypal, and all you have to do is enter your password. This is a very secure site, and there are more and more dealers who only want to deal with Paypal. It's a whole lot easier than having to write checks or get money orders. Unless it is something I really want, I usually do not bid on items that don't take Paypal. For me, I usually delete the won item after I have received it. This gives me a way to track my purchases. If something has not arrived within a couple of weeks I get in touch with the seller and ask for a reason: Did Paypal not go through? Have they lost the item? Etc.

Messages: This is where sellers communicate with you if you have asked them a question (which I highly recommend if you are wary of an item, or want to know dimensions, etc). Also, sometimes you will receive eBay messages in your Email account – before answering these, most of them are scams – check with your eBay Message box. Never ever give out your username and password unless the message has come from EBay in your message box. They will look like an eBay message with the logo included, but when you read the message it reads like it has been translated from another language, the English is usually quite stilted, and some of the words are wrong. Only answer messages in your eBay Message box.

Didn't win: Very obvious! It's useful to go back to item and see how the bidding went. Sometimes I kick myself when the item goes for 50¢ or a \$1.00 more than I bid, but as you will have learnt from the tutorial, you

don't really know what the other bidder had bid. If you really want an item, be brave!!

Searches: The fun part. The world is your oyster, and yes you can bid on oysters!! Towards the top of the result of the "Search" item is a small box that says "Advanced Search." Again, this will have been covered in the tutorial. In this section you can ask for all such items as you have listed that were sold in the last month (called Closed Auctions). This will give you an idea of what this particular item is likely to be sold at. Also, when you save a "Search," it asks whether you would like an Email as to when this item comes up for auction. It's okay to do this if you have only a few "Searches"; I currently have 62, which would flood my Email box, so I chose not to have Email alerts. I check several of my searches every day, and go through them all once a week – usually Sunday morning. Auctions typically run for 7 days, so if you check once a week you will pick up all current auctions. The tutorial will have explained this also.

When you select your search items, try several spellings of the country or item since some sellers can't spell and sometimes their fingers type in wrong words. My main "Searches" are Stamps (I tick the box that says "in description" — this usually brings up the covers), Postcards, and Paper (ephemera). Sometimes if there is a lot of activity in the eBay Stores category, I will put a separate search in for those items. Searches are divided into two sections, those items being sold by individuals and those by sellers who have on-line eBay stores.

Feedback: A very important part of eBay. When you select an item to watch, as you begin, make sure to check the profile of the seller. To do this you click on the seller name. This will show you how he/she performs. If there are any negatives, or the percentage of happy campers is below 90%, I would stay away from that seller. Also, it is important for you to leave feedback as to how you felt the transaction went. I personally enter my feedback after I have received the item. This lets the seller know that I have received the item and that I am happy with it, and it saves you time in Emailing the seller that you have received the item. The tutorial will also tell you about the various levels of comment.

In finishing, I hope I have assuaged some worries of those who haven't discovered the wonders of eBay. Every day is like going to the bourse, but from the comfort of your own home. I have also found that prices are lower, as the sellers do not have to buy the booth and truck their material all over the country. But that being said, there is still the thrill of finding that missing piece at the show. Also, unless you deal with the same seller over time, you do not set up the relationship as you do with dealers at shows, though in my case I buy from some of the same dealers over eBay and at shows. If you have any questions, here are the

Ukrainian Collectibles Society (Toronto) November 1st Exhibition Theme: The Holodomor

The Ukrainian Collectibles Society (Toronto), a



member of the GTAPA, staged a one-day event on Saturday November 1st, 2008 at 'Ukrainian Canadian Social Services' (at Jane and Bloor Streets, Toronto). The show's theme was The 75th Anniversary of the Ukrainian Holodomor Famine-Genocide.

The word 'holodomor' essentially translates to 'death by starvation'.

Planning for the event took place over a seven-month period, during which the composition of our show was eventually established. **Jerry Kalyn** completed a beautiful personal postage stamp for this event. However other concerns weren't as easy. How so?


Through an Act of Parliament this past spring, Canada was the first western nation to officially recognize the Holodomor as a genocide. Thus an official cancel became possible, even though time was tight for a November event. During the planning for this cancel, various theme sketches were rendered. Our initial choice, submitted in mid-September, was based upon an historical depiction. However, as a few in our club suspected, it was deemed too morose. What to do at this late stage? With **Peter Butler**'s guidance and some preliminary material, the rendition of a cancel designed by Canada Post was, well, simply beautiful! Speaking with colleagues in our club, and others that may well now join after having viewed this show, we couldn't be more grateful for their assistance, leadership, and professionalism.



Second, a federal election came about during our planning period. This stalled printing of covers for quite a while, as our initial printing house was busy completing flyers for political candidates. We'd have to wait. Once the election was over, in October, we then discovered that the new machinery the printer was now using could no longer complete #8 envelopes. Uh-oh, where could we turn on such short notice? **Troyak**, our GTAPA's Polish Canadian Coin and Stamp Club, had a connection which was able to come through right away! We were able to print our 250 colour-and-numbered covers and 250 black-and-white covers, which became available starting with this show.

In both cases above, truly heart-warming, and we do indeed feel blessed. As our club grows, we continue to experience 'maturing pains'. While we have made great strides, there most certainly is still quite a bit to learn. With experience, and with the friends we have in the

GTAPA and Canada Post, every further step we take will be that much better.



The back of the cover reads:

The International Remembrance Flame traveling through 33 countries, including 15 Canadian cities, helped raise awareness of the forced famine in Ukraine in 1932-33. The Flame began its journey in Australia and arrived in Canada on April 18, 2008. The launch across Canada took place prior to the opening of the exhibit Holdomor: Genocide by Famine at Toronto's City Hall. The International Torch Relay reaches Ukraine in November 2008 to be part of the official state commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the great Ukrainian Famine and Genocide.

Ukraine remembers -- the World Acknowledges!

We exhibited 22 frames of material, including stamps, coins, cards, and medals. John Jaciw, a very prominent Canadian designer of Ukrainian heritage, found out about our event and donated an entire frame of Holodomorbased 'essay' medal designs as exhibition material. Throughout the day, several hundred people paid a visit. This also included some of our member's parents, who for the first time finally had an opportunity to see what we spend so much of our time and money on. Thanks to this, for most of us also collect 'Canada'!

Not all of our 22 frames showed Holodomor material. There really isn't that much of a philatelic or numismatic nature out there right now, most if it appearing after Ukraine's recent independence from the former-USSR in 1991. Indeed, for some the Holodomor is still difficult to acknowledge. Historical documents are slowly trickling out of formerly sealed state archives to substantiate much of what millions of people experienced.

In part, we view Holodomor events such as ours as educational. It helps to outline a period of history in eastern Europe, specific to Ukraine but shared by neighbouring nations as well, when the former-USSR committed to a policy of enforced collective farming while exporting major quantities of grain. The most harmful effect of this effort was the pain of death by starvation, as 7 million or more Ukrainians (around 25% of its population at that time) eventually died due to this, during 1932 and 1933. We continue to be involved in similar educational efforts, for example in completing a table and exhibit during 'Holodomor Education Week', November 17-20 at the Ukrainian Cultural Centre in Toronto.

Many Canadians with some Ukrainian heritage keep their fingers crossed, as we witness the continued 'birthing pains' of a relatively young democracy, and who's identity is very much shaped by issues from its past. We can sell your
