Website Reactivated

fter a lengthy period of dormancy, we are pleased to announce that the web site of the GTAPA has returned to active status. At first glance, it may appear that nothing has changed from the old site, but that is far from being the case. As is usual, some of the sections are fully operational, but others are waiting for submissions to populate the space available.

Under the heading 'Member Clubs' a link has been established to the email address for each club's designated contact. An additional link has been set up to connect directly with club web sites, if they exist. For clubs not having a web presence, a provision is being made to allow for s "mini site" within the GTAPA site.

The "Coming Events" operates both via the sidebar and the field in the upper right that shows the next five events. By clicking on the event in the display field, a viewer will be taken to a page containing details of the specific event. A click on the side bar will display a calendar containing every event that has been submitted. The calendar can, of course, be advanced by using the arrows at the top.

The "GTAPA News" will allow clubs to present stories and pictures of club activities in a timely fashion. To have a story posted, a club needs to submit a Word document (please don't format) with jpeg photos attached. Stories will be retained while relevant after which they will either be moved to an archive or deleted.

It is the hope that this web site will become the spot where internet surfers will visit first to discover philatelic activity in the Greater Toronto Area.

We have assigned two webmasters to ensure regular and prompt access for any and all club postings.




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President's Message

Grow Your Club: Does your club need a boost?

In the past few months I have visited many clubs and club events learning many tips that have stimulated a few of the clubs.

Other than the obvious examples - West Toronto's Mall Show - Oshawa's 400 lot club auction - the one day shows and bourses of Troyak, Peterborough, Ajax and other clubs - there are many lessons to be learned visiting other club functions. While some of the following ideas may not be new they are working and worth repeating.

As a visiting guest of the Trenton and Peterborough club I could not help noticing that both clubs have an impressive lineup, each month, of a guest dealer or speaker.

Peterborough, for example, has a large number of "Woolworth Books" (5¢ and 10¢ per stamp). Several clubs are starting or have strong sale circuit books.

Ajax's membership is growing as a result of the club auction each meeting as well as the growing number of sales circuit books. Member turn out has likely doubled from last season.

Peterborough moved its winter meetings from evenings to days, a small thing, but helped its members who did not want to drive in the dark or winter conditions.

Some clubs suspend meetings throughout the summer months, while others meet once a month and still others do not skip a beat, meeting as usual but starting earlier in the day.

Oshawa/Whitby uses a table of honour. Members bring their priced extra stamps, in stock books, boxes, bags, albums etc. - stamps are put on a table in the middle of the room where other members can pick up one of the items mentioned, take it to their table and go through looking for treasures. When done, they look for the member who put the stamps on the table and pay him directly. This works especially well as members can go through a large number of stamps each meeting while others are divesting themselves of their extra stamps. A Win - Win situation!

Other clubs use door prize draws as an interest getter. Many of the door prizes are donated and tickets are purchased for a minimal amount with proceeds going to club coffers. Other clubs have a straight 50/50 draw winners are always happy!



The Old Man of the Mountains

The Old Man was a natural rock formation in the Franconia Notch of the White Mountains, located on Cannon Mountain. Cannon Mountain used to be called Profile Mountain but it was renamed in 1917. Cannon Mountain, with a height of 3,693 m and two others nearby, are collectively known as the" Cannon Balls" because of their rounded shape.



The mountain is a type of geological formation known as an exfoliating granite dome which means it is layered like an onion. It is these layers, overlapping one upon the other, that made the face, about 13 m high, and 9 m wide.

In recent years, cables and epoxy glue were used in an attempt to counter weathering, especially the effects of ice and snow. But overnight May 2/3, 2003, the Old Man of the Mountain fell away.



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Unusual Postage Stamps by Jerry Piotrowski

In an earlier article in this series I wrote about the Hungarian souvenir sheet issued with a die cut hole in the stamp. Other than perfins <u>added</u> by private or government interests after the actual stamps have been produced many stamp issues have had holes used as part of the design.

In 1996 Canada issued a semi-postal (Scott B13) for Canadian Literacy. This stamp has a die cut hole in the shape of a missing jigsaw puzzle piece. The numeral used for the denomination on a souvenir sheet issued in 1999 by the Netherlands to commemorate Netherlands Postal Service Bicentennial (Scott 1039) is made up of a series of perforations. Liechtenstein's Christmas issue of 2004 (Scott 1035-07) was of stamps where the edges have been punched out with a series of hole simulating lacework.

The US Postal Service honored Alfred Hitchcock in 1998 with a stamp in the series Legends of Hollywood (Scott 3226). On the upper left corner of the stamp is a die cut of the famous Hitchcock profile.

Related to the die cuts in the actual stamp design are

special additions to the perforations on some issues. The above-mentioned Hitchcock stamp has an additional feature namely that the corner perforations on the stamps are in the shape of stars in keeping with his status as a star.



Canada has also used special perforations on two issues. The October 2005 Big Cats issue (Scott 2122-23) used a Maple Leaf to replace 3 perforation holes between the two stamps. The same technique was used for the 3007 International Polar Year issue (Scott 2204-05)

Afghani Refugee Camp In Pakistan

The modern history of Afghanistan, from its invasion by the Soviet Union in 1979, to the CIA-backing of the Taliban as a guerrilla army, their subsequent ascension to power, and the US war launched against Afghanistan after 9/11 is well known to Canadians. It is especially poignant given the fact that 143 Canadian soldiers and sailors have died in the conflict (at the time of printing this article) since Canada became involved in 2002.



This cover is from Ghulam Khan, c/o Nawan Khesari, Banda Camp, c/o Latif Madical (*sic.*) Store, Hangu Distt. Kohat, Pakistan. It is addressed – on the same side of the envelope – to the World Service Authority, B.M.C. Passport, WCIV XX London U.K. There is also a rectangular registration handstamp reading: R/ HANGU (Kohat), and a manuscript R141. The reverse of the cover is franked with 5 Rupees and 60 paisas of stamps. The cancels are very faint, but date from 1982.

Kohat is a medium-sized town in North West Frontier Province (NWFP) in Pakistan, is located at an elevation of 489 metres and is the capital of Kohat District. The area is home to Pashto-speaking tribes, who welcomed their Pashto-speaking neighbours from Afghanistan after the Soviet invasion in 1979. Kohat is home to a score of refugee camps. This cover may have come from either Lakhti Banda or Ghulam Banda camp.

The World Service Authority is an organization that issues passports to stateless persons. It is located in London. "The mandate for a World Passport on Article 13 (2) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights: Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and return to his country"ⁱ. The World Passport has been accepted on a *de facto* basis by many countries, and as a *de jure* passport in six. Canada has recognized the World Passport, on occasion.

This cover thus records the application of a presumably stateless Afghani refugee living in Pakistan to obtain a World Passport. We cannot know if Ghulam Khan received his passport and left Pakistan. Many refugees returned to Afghanistan after the withdrawal of Soviet forces in 1989. However, many more remain. According to a United Nations High Commission for Refugees map of Afghanistan Refugee Camps in 2004ⁱⁱ, there were at least 2.5 million Afghanis were still living in Pakistan, housed in 150-190 refugee camps, mainly along the border with Afghanistan . However, some estimates run to 10 million.

After two generations of living in Pakistan, many Afghans have melded into the NWFP culture. Some are involved in everything from illegal smuggling operations and terrorism; others have obtained positions of skilled labour and legal commerce, and made fortunesⁱⁱⁱ. Afghans in Pakistan are there to stay.

An Introduction To Collecting Mourning Covers

Perhaps no other aspect of social history has the customs, rituals, behaviour and beliefs than those surrounding death. In spite of being to some, a morbid subject, collecting of mourning memorabilia-necrology is a popular topic and includes of course, covers, stamps and other philatelic material –Necrophilately -. This interest in covers has been memorialized by a musical piece of the 30's, A LETTER EDGED IN BLACK, and more recently, for those with an interest in Country Western music, the song MULE TRAIN by Frankie Lane which contains the phrase "There's a letter full of sadness and it's black around the border".

According to a report in MOURNING NOTES, the journal of THE MOURNING STAMPS AND COVERS CLUB, in early 2009, Mourning Covers (MCs) are now known to have been used in at least 250 different stamp issuing countries. The list includes 17 stamp issuing entities known as dead or inactive countries.

The black marking on MCs make them distinguishable from other types of covers. These are some of the major characteristics of MCs:



• Width of the marking: This can vary from

approximately one m.m. to 4.1 cm. And size varies widely. This is an opportune time to elaborate on the width of the black mourning mark. Often, dealers and novice MC collectors, have been vocal that the width of the black

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band varies according to the relationship of the sender and the receiver. Others have expressed belief that the black band was of larger size during the initial mourning period and was then gradually reduced. These are both myths which have been documentary dispelled.

• *Size*: Covers are known to be as small as 7.9 x 4.1 cm. And as large as 2.9 x 16.2 cm.

• *Shape*: The most common shape is rectangular but some are squarish and other stranger shapes have been found.

• *Placement of the black marking*: Typically on the edge of the cover but some have inset lines and some with diagonal stripes or a single stripe.

• *Design of the marking*: Most often this is a straight line but more elaborate designs are known.

• *Reverse and back flap designs*: These are often fancier than the front and some have a flap embossment and a wax seal.

Most of the knowledge that this writer has acquired has been gleaned from a book "MOURNING COVERS: The *Cultural and Postal History of Letters Edged in Black*" by Ernest A Mosher, now deceased. This book of 354 pages was based on Ernest's own collection of over 2,000 MCs and another 2,000 MCs made available by dealers and other collectors. Much of the data used in preparation of this article is attributable to this book.

The mourning mark designs categorized in Ernest's book, are as follows:

- Type 1: Basic Black Edge.
- Type 2: Black Edge on Back Only.

• Types 3, 4,and 5: More elaborate designs that are rarely found.

• Type 6: Cross - Hatched

• Type 7: Solid Left Corner.



- Type 8: Left Top Corner Angle Mark
- Type 9: Left Corner Angle Stripes
- Types 10 to 17: All very elusive markings.

Hello again with what has turned out to be a poplar segment in the PhilaJournal.

As an engineering consultant, I find that before settling into a particular new area of collecting, I have to determine the exact direction I wish to go into and then plan for it accordingly.

My Machin collecting bug started many years ago when I simply started amassing a huge number of stamps with a view to sorting at a later date. Unfortunately without any real planning the collection simply grew but in no specific direction. My limited sorting at that time consisted of grouping the various face values and/or colours together. Then over a period, subtle differences between certain stamps of the same value and colour started to catch my eye. It was not until later that I learned the differences resulted from the two printing methods involved, photogravure and lithography. Without knowing the true differences I began separating all the stamps with a "duller" appearance, these I learned later were the lithographed items.

During my interrogation of these stamps I also noticed recurrent differences in the widths of the values. Fortunately most differences were also linked to colour changes, which made for easier recognition. However, some changes did occur without a new colour. Of note here were the 2p greenish grey, the 4p turquoise, the 5p grayish rose, the 10p grayish orange, the 20p purplish grey, and the 75p charcoal grey values.

I later learned that the designer Jeffrey Matthews had been chosen by the "powers that be" at the Royal Mail to create a sleeker (narrower) set of numerals. These new numerals were first introduced on 30th March 1983. Each value in turn was reprinted with this new more modern style and later the denominations were also repositioned onto a uniformed grid in the bottom left hand corner. These number changes were completed by 1988 to the whole of the Machin range.

These changes to the numerals gave further reasons for me to concentrate even more into that specific area where even more various subtle differences were also noted. These differences manifested themselves as thicker and/or thinner elements of the figures, their location relative to the "P" for pence and the size and form of the actual serifs on the figures and letters. Of particular note here are the 1p crimson, the 2½p pale magenta, the 7½p pale chestnut, The release earlier this year of stamps printed by "Cartor" bearing the "Garamond" font numerals together with additional variations to the 10p & 20p fonts opens up the hunt even further.

RECOGNIZING VARIATIONS

With a view to alleviating some of the aggravations encountered in collecting Machins each article will attempt to explain/explore a common variation that has caused problems.

Phosphor Bands and/or Lines (Commonly known as Tagging in N. America)

The adding of Phosphor Band(s)/Coat to the surface of stamps was to enable the automatic sorting machines, in use by the British Post Office, to determine that the mail was correctly stamped and to sort it according to the paid rate (1st and/or 2^{nd} class). Additional changes to these have since been introduced.

The adding of this phosphor to the stamps is generally conducted by the printing of either one or two surface bands or as an embedded all over coating.

Many of the Phosphor Bands can be readily seen on the front face of the stamp by viewing it directly or at a slight tilted angle from the horizontal against a good light (I prefer daylight). This method allows the light to "bounce" off the surface and the differences caused by the phosphor can be easily seen.

For some types of tagging the use of a UV Light will be required, either short wave for old phosphor or long wave for issues after 1993. There are various degrees of fluorescence and phosphorescence (afterglow).

The majority of bands are either 4mm or 4.75mm wide. The 4.75mm band is the result of a 9.5mm band printed over the perforation between two stamps.

The early Machins had the old "Phosphor B" type of phosphor applied as either a centre band, two side bands, or a single side band in either a green or blue colour. In the mid 1980s a new "Phosphor A" was brought into use. The bands on these stamps fluoresce a little fainter than the previous printings, and are violet in colour.

"C Phosphor" had an additive called cartax mixed with the phosphor ink. This allowed the stamps to fluoresce a yellow green colour when viewed under long wave ultra violet light. It is also termed AY phosphor by some specialist groups. Early printings of this type were the 18p printed by Enschede in 1991.

Some of the earlier stamps also included a layer of varnish, either 2mm or 4mm wide, under the phosphor. Additional phosphors also include "JET" and "NOVAGLO" and others.


Other easily identifiable types also include those with inset, short and notched bands and are generally from booklet sources.

Different levels of phosphorescence are also to be found in stamps with an embedded coating.

A CHILLY CHOICE COMMERCIAL OR PHILATELIC MAIL?

A recent and quite fortuitous purchase was the postcard shown below. Not that I care for penguins, but this card bears the ultra-unusual originating mark of the Kerguelen Islands, a French possession close to Antarctica, and in addition it is part of the Poulenc series of "Dear Doctor" cards.



This Montreal-based drug company had the brainwave of sending mass-produced cards to doctors in North America from extraordinary locations, extolling the virtues of newly-marketed drugs. Huge mailings were made, but the individual physician was almost certain to read the blurb. The text was prepared in a personalized handwriting, but in a strong and clear (yet neither feminine nor masculine) hand. I invite the reader to look at the address – the Poulenc company itself – and to compare the writing. The ink is different in colour than the printed message; it looks handwritten. The letters 'd' and 'r' show close similarity.



So is this particular example philatelic mail? Undoubtedly! But it also had a commercial purpose and this card has personality aplenty. Count me in among those collectors who want to complete the journey suggested here, from pole to pole.

From Here To Eternity by Fraser McKee

It was of considerable interest to read the item in the latest PhilaJournal (Spring 2010) under the heading of the North Toronto Stamp Club about "You can't take it with you!" I.e., what to do about your (no doubt very valuable.... at least to you!) collection of stamps as you age. As noted the Club is planning a most useful talk on inventory, insurance, options for disposal, bequest solutions and so forth.

What made it interesting to me was exactly the same discussion held about a year and a half ago by another group of collectors to which I belong. This is the North American branch of the Henty Society. We are collectors and students (sic!) of the 100 or so books written by George Alfred Henty between about 1875 and 1908. Older members may recall "With Wolfe in Canada," "One of the 28th," "Under Drake's Flag," "With Clive In India," "In the Reign of Terror" and so forth. All carefully written histories designed mostly for young boys, but enjoyed by many, and good copies with elegant coloured covers. Some 1st editions, like Penny Blacks, are worth in the thousands, many in reasonably good condition several \$100. Hence the interest as to what should be done with this part of one's estate for those who had considerable collections.

We had a most fascinating discussion, the following points being noted: collections should indeed be inventoried in some detail, and insured; while they could just be left for your estate's executors to resolve (often children with no knowledge or interest in the books directly), consideration might be given for donating them, even now, or on one's death, to various libraries or research centers, or to a selection of family members. And even more intriguing, the consensus was that the best idea was to break up collections and distribute them around, in order to "spread the word," to increase the number of people who might thereby become interested. It was felt that any libraries who would be interested in such a donation would probably already have a significant collection of G.A.H.'s works, thus you'd only be contributing in quite a degree to duplication, and thus probably sell-off anyway. And stay away from donations to elegant but closed collections that are not available to a wider public.

Maybe there's a lesson here for stamp collectors... indeed "From here to eternity, and You can't take it with you!"

The World's Earliest Recorded Cover Bearing A Stamp

All stamp collectors know stories about the world's first postage stamp, the Penny Black. Here is one I hadn't heard, perhaps it is new to you also. The cover illustrated below was scanned from a flyer I found in a well-worn philatelic journal that I picked up at an auction recently. I had never thought that there was such a thing as a first day cover for the first stamp. This cover can certainly be considered for that label.



Recently confirmed by several well-respected expertizing agencies from around the world, this cover is authentic. The Penny Blacks were available from post offices in England on May 1st, 1840, though it was not valid for payment of postage until May 6th 1840. The 1d Penny Black lettered LD (bottom corners of the stamp) was from Plate 1a. On the back fold of the letter can be clearly seen, a cancellation dated May 1st, 1840 and there is a red, Maltese Cross cancellation applied to the stamp and cover (It's difficult to see in this picture.) Since the stamp was not to be used until May 6th, the letter was taxed, indicated by the large "2" for the 2d to be paid, 1d for postage plus a 1d fine to be paid by the recipient, for posting the letter before the allowed date.

The stamp has been removed from the envelope for examination only and re-hinged in place. The item is "unique" – being the only known "use" of the world's first stamp on the first day it could have been purchased.
