

The Machin Corner No. 11

Hello again.

I was recently asked how I came to the decision to collect Machins and what made me collect the way that I did. For years I have been amassing large quantities of British stamps of which Machins form but a small amount. With a career background that involved the inspection of product for a living, it must have been inevitable that things I learned in my career be transposed into my most favourite hobby. Thus when confronted with a large quantity of the same product, it is far easier to lay them all out and make comparisons from one to another and it is surprising just how easy it is to determine when one is different from all the others. So it is the same with stamps, they are after all just another form of product.

I personally have found that regular sized Machins, they measure 20mm x 24mm, can be mounted 90 stamps to a page and this enables the sheets to be handled and viewed quite readily. Using regular sheets of paper for mounting (8½" x 11"), the larger sizes need to be mounted in quantities of 36 and 42. Any other stamps may also be viewed in a similar way for colour variations or deviations from the norm. The stamps are sorted by denomination and colour, then by printing method (photogravure or lithography) and finally by phosphor bands (one, two or all over). Only stamps of the same finding are then mounted on a page.

Once a page has been fully completed, say the 20p Purplish Grey, printed in Lithography with an allover phosphor the search can then take place for whatever elusive deviation is known to exist, in this case the original versus the redrawn and narrower value. When compared side by side the difference is quite outstanding. The finest examples can then be removed and mounted in an album prepared to exhibit and demonstrate the differences. Reaching this point has proven to be a rather demanding exercise, one that also seems never ending.

Because the release of Machins continues and will do so as long as her Majesty remains on the throne, a collector needs to decide between collecting a "closed" or an "open" group of Machins.

The open group can range from one of all Machins to any group that is still being issued and these will change from year to year while a "closed" group means one where there will be no more issues. For example the Pre-

-Decimal issues and those of decimal stamps with a face value ending in a halfpenny. These closed groups are easier to plan-for as the extent of their range is already known, whereas the open groups are being added to on a fairly regular basis. Like so many things in stamp collecting there is no right or wrong way to collect Machins they are simply different.

So until next time good luck and happy sorting... Dave

Bisect Stamp

A Bisect is a postage stamp cut in half (usually diagonally), and used to pay half its face value, e.g. half a ten cent stamp to pay five.

When stocks of a certain stamp ran out, postmasters sometimes resorted to cutting higher denominated stamps in half, vertically or diagonally, thus obtaining two "stamps" each representing half of the original monetary value, or "face" value, of the uncut stamp. The general public also resorted to this practice, sometimes pursuant to official or tacit permission and sometimes without any express authorization.

Many bisects and splits are considerably more valuable than the stamps from which they were made. These, however, only have philatelic value when the cut portion is still affixed to the letter or envelope or a piece showing the postmarks, as otherwise it cannot be confirmed that the stamp was in fact postally used as a split and not simply a complete stamp that was cut up after use. Don't try it today - it's illegal to cut, deface or even overlap

stamps on your mail.



New Brunswick #9a, 10c vermilion, Queen Victoria Very Fine Used Bisect on folded letter from Douglastown (cancel) to Moncton.

Douglastown was originally known as Gretna Green and was founded in 1812 by two Scottish immigrants, Alexander Rankin and James Gilmour. The post office was established in 1835, but the community wasn't incorporated as a village until 1966. Douglastown is now a Canadian suburban which was amalgamated in 1995 to form the City of Miramichi, New Brunswick.

Many of these instances have been well documented in postal history. For example the Channel Islands bisects during the World War II German military occupation.

The most common bisect was the twopenny orange from January 1938 (picture at right)

The second bisect (below) was the twopenny stamp from the "Centenary of First Postage Stamps" (issued 6th May 1940).

A Little Knowledge is a WONDERFUL Thing

For this column I'd like to show two covers, both recent eBay purchases, where contextual knowledge helped me acquire very useful items.

The first is an early airmail cover, from an experimental Supermarine 'Southampton' flying boat survey flight. Led by the improbably named Group-Capt. Cave-Brown-Cave (!), the four planes left Felixstowe Oct. 14, 1927, reaching Calcutta on Feb. 3, 1928, and Broome, Australia on June 1. Leaving Darwin, Australia on Sept. 1, it reached its furthest point in the Orient, Manila, on Nov. 9th. There the aviators were greeted as heroes and a special set of stamps overprinted "L.O.F." for "London Orient Flight" was issued in their honour. Between 500 and 700 covers were sent from Manila to Hong Kong (and beyond) on the return flight Nov. 16 and my new possession was one of these! Though duly back stamped on arrival in Hong Kong on the morning of Nov. 18 the seller did not see the importance of the cover to Hong Kong aerophilately – it is part of the first mail to be carried into the Colony by airplane.



The second cover is far easier to describe. Sent 27 May 1941, it attracted my eye because it bears two of the Centenary designs issued in February of that year.

One of them carried the requisition number "A", for the consignment of the six-value set. I am pretty sure that because of this selvedge tab I had to fight for the cover - but I was ultimately much more interested in the corner card information. The sender was W. E. Jones of 23 A Cameron Road in Kowloon – and the **stamp's designer**! The association is worth far more to me than the stamps on it, or even the tiny censor marking, a boxed "44", on the reverse.

Baden-Powell Boer War Patriotic Cards

Lord Baden-Powell became famous during the Boer War in successfully defending the garrison town of Mafeking in the Cape Of

Good Hope from a Boer siege that lasted 216 days, from October 14, 1899 to May 17, 1900. As a result, a number of "patriotic cards" were printed to celebrate this achievement, including these two mint cards.

Other postally used cards are shown below.



This card was mailed from London, England on July 19, 1900, to Washington, DC. It has a one penny Postage and Inland Revenue stamp, with a nice London 42, 10 pm, JY 19



cancel. Also on the back is a Washington, Station C Received cancel showing receipt at 7:30 pm on Jul 29. This equates to ten days delivery via transatlantic ship.



The card on the next page was mailed from South Hampstead, London on June 8, 1900 to Montreal. It shows a Hampstead SW 3 cancel of 3:30 pm, JU 8, even though someone had peeled off the stamp (for shame!). The Montreal cancellation has a date of June 18, which means another ten day delivery. This is even more impressive since the delivery had an extra step "Via New York".



This last card was mailed from the Cape of Good Hope on May 23 to Keene, Peterboro Co. Ontario. It has a one penny Cape of Good Hope

stamp with a nice 23 May 00 Cape Colony cancel. On the front is a Keene, ON cancel with what looks like a date of JU 2, 00. Note that the mail date of May 23 was only one week after the relief of the siege on May 17.



Also of interest is the printing near the bottom centre of the front of the card, which says "Besieged October 14, 1899, Relieved". The world was following the news of a relief column of soldiers marching toward Mafeking, and it appears this card creator wanted his product available for sale in time for the relief. So he let the buyer fill in the actual relief date, which this sender did by writing in "17th May 1900".



Titanic

This year, many countries including Canada have issued stamps to mark the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic. At least two of these issues fall into the Unusual Postage Stamps category.

On April 12 Hungary issued a souvenir sheet showing the Titanic heading towards the iceberg. The two stamps show parts of the ship. The production of the sheet, which is embossed to simulate waves, used an iridescent spot varnish screen-printing process to scatter particles across the sheet creating an icy sparkle. The sheet also honours Dr. Árpád Lengyel, the ship's doctor on the RMS Carpathia the first vessel to hurry to Titanic's aid. His portrait along with a silhouette of the Carpathia appears in the upper right corner of the sheet.





On April 16 Belgium issued a small sheet of two stamps in memory of Titanic. As with other 3D or stereoscopic issues the two stamps are not completely identical. Slight differences are required to allow for the 3D effect to be appreciated when seen through special glasses.

The sheet was sold along with a pair of 3D glasses allowing buyers to not only view the sheet but also enjoy the April 2012 release of the 3D version of James Cameron's 1997 movie Titanic.

What's New at the Greene Foundation? Garfield Portch FRPSC

By now many readers will be aware that there is a new machine residing at the Vincent Graves Greene Philatelic Research Foundation that is being used for the forensic analysis of stamps and other philatelic material.

The machine is called a Video Spectral Comparator, model VSC 6000/HS manufactured in the United Kingdom by Foster+Freeman. The company literature refers to this technology as "an advanced workstation for the visual examination of questioned documents". Although originally intended for the analysis of banknotes, security documents and passports the technology can be easily adapted to the field of forensic philately. At present there are only three of these machines in the world that are being used for the analysis of philatelic material. They are at the Royal Philatelic Society in London, England; the Smithsonian in Washington; and the Greene Foundation in Toronto.



The VSC 6000 consists of a large box containing a number of lamps, filters and optical lenses working in conjunction with a desktop computer and a large (30") flat screen monitor. It features an imaging system with distortion free magnification up to X170. The operator navigates the system using on-screen icons via a PC mouse.

In operation, the subject stamp can be illuminated by lamps using ultraviolet, infrared or the complete range of visible light. The light can be applied as a floodlight or spotlight from above or transmitted (from behind) light. Each range of lighting permits the examination of a particular characteristic of paper, ink or applied markings. The number of combinations of light wavelengths and filters is in excess of 450 (before considering magnification). Of special interest to us is the examination to








provide evidence of the removal of postal markings. The following photographs display a small sampling of results obtained to date.

The first photo shows a stamp with what appears to be heavily cancelled on the right. By inverting the light (creating a negative), we can see a repair hidden in the cancellation. Magnification (x25) shows the expert repair.












Floodlighting and magnification (X15) shows the addition of a top margin and the hand painting to fill the missing part of the design.

(Note the details presented at the foot of the illustration to preserve the technical details of the examination.)



A photograph of the analysis of colour on a stamp. Each line on the graph is a colour sampling from various points on the stamp and indicates a small shading variance.

Bvcombining magnification, fluorescence comparison and infrared, we are able to see and photograph the distinctive diamond pattern of the Bothwell paper Large in Queens.


An analysis of paper fluorescence shows up the expert repair of the upper right corner on this stamp.

yellow phosphor while the second shows the regular phosphor and the phosphor plate number in the margin.






Mail addressed to the "Moskauer Hilfskomite für Kriegsgefangene" in Denmark during WW1

On October 3 1914 the International Red Cross Committee in Geneva contacted the Danish Red Cross in Copenhagen asking it to set up an office to provide among other things a means of forwarding letters from Russian prisoners of war held in camps in Germany to their families in Russia. It is estimated that during the period 1915 –1917 this office handled almost 1,400,000 letters the contents of which were forwarded to Russia.

Four types of envelopes were used in mailing the items to Copenhagen. Plain envelopes printed Kriegsgefangenensendung (Prisoner of war mail), printed envelopes for specific camps and preaddressed envelopes for use by several camps. Some of the camp-specific and preaddressed envelopes must have been printed several times since varieties in fonts or layouts are evident.



Printed addressed envelope. Gnadenfrei 13.10.16. This envelope was used by several camps. Offizierlager. The prison had been a boy's school belonging to a religious brotherhood. Gnadenfrei is present day Pilawa Górna in Poland.

As a rule commissioned officer were held in "Offizierlager" (Officer Camp) while enlisted men and NCOs (non-commissioned officers) were held in "Mannschaftslager" (Unit Camp). A "Lazarett" was a military hospital for POW's either an independent camp or a part of a larger camp. Civilians of enemy states were held in "Internierungslager" (Internment camp).

In my collection of over 40 covers (which includes different envelopes from certain camps) most are from Officer Camps. These Russian officers



would have used a Cyrillic script at home either quickly adapted to using the alphabet Latin possibly had help from the camp guards in addressing the envelopes. Certainly the letters being sent home would have been using Cyrillic script so that their families at home could read them.

Plain envelope. Königstein 6.7.17 Offizierlager. The prison camp was in a fortress high above the river Elbe.

As prisoner of war mail all items were free of postage and were marked either with the written text or hand stamp "Kriegsgefangenensendung" (Prisoner of war mail). In some cases if a prisoner had the funds and chose

to send the letter by registered post then a 40-Pfennig stamps was required. All items sent to the agency were stamped with a regular cancellation device showing the camp name and cancellation date and are therefore easily identifiable as to the camp origin.



Camp specific envelope. Crefeld 8.12.16 Offizierlager. The camp was also the site of a Lazarett.

All items were censored and show a variety of "Geprüft" (inspected/checked) hand stamps usually with the camp name included (see second cover) One of the covers in my collection has an uncommon embossed censor mark. In addition to being censored, the mail was held for a period of about 10 days before being mailed to Denmark thus making anything that might have slipped by the censor in effect "stale dated information". Virtually all covers show a "Fa" ("Frist abgelaufen" –time period expired) marking of one sort or another. This wait time can be verified on some covers, which show a stamped date as received by the censor of 10 or so days prior to cancellation and mailing.



Printed POW mail envelope. Gütersloh 1.3.16 Offizierlager: The camp consisted of brick buildings originally built as a sanatorium.

Luckily only the contents of these covers to Denmark were forwarded to Russia and just as with the post WW2 mail from Poland to the International Red Cross in Geneva the covers survived and are now in the hands of collectors and postal historians.






