Thank you Scarborough Stamp Club members for the warm reception as well as the opportunity to participate in your club meeting and discussions.



Birthday Recognition: Douglas G. A. Myall by Garfield Portch FRPSC

Collectors of the Machin definitive stamps of Great Britain will quickly recognize the name Douglas G. A. Myall, the author of the Deegam Catalogue. Mr. Myall is one of the leading authorities on this popular issue of postage stamps. In addition to his catalogue, he is also a regular contributor to the British Philatelic Bulletin and several other fine British publications. On December 17, 2012, Mr. Myall will celebrate his 90th birthday.

The West Toronto Stamp Club Machin Study Group will recognize this milestone event by issuing a special cachet envelope and picture postage. The cachet design may differ slightly from the illustration below. A photo of the picture postage is not available at this time.



The cachet will be a limited edition of 90 (numbered) envelopes, cancelled using the RPSC's 125th Anniversary device. After responding to the requests of the Study Group members, the remaining cachet envelopes, single stamps and "keepsake" panes will be offered for general sale on a first come, first served basis.

The MACHIN Corner Dave Moss davemoss@sympatico.ca

Hello again,

I was, once again, doing some sorting and, subsequently mounting, some of my most favourite, and might I add, extensive accumulation, of "low end" face value Machins. It struck me that although I was searching for what I felt were elusive flaws and/or variations on these stamps and I was using a Deegam Catalogue as an aid and guide to do this, that there seems to me to be a serious lack, by Mr. Mayall, in identifying items that would fall under my description of a flaw. I'm not speaking of the missing or displaced Phosphor Bands or items like the most frequently searched for $\frac{1}{2p}$ Turquoise with 1 Left Phosphor Band, which only appeared in the £1 Wedgwood Booklet, but more like the often small and quite insignificant spot that appears in the band of the crown or the less common deformed base to the 2 in the $\frac{1}{2}$. These types of flaws can be so easily overlooked by a collector who may also feel that to some extent they are not even worth the bother of identifying.

So, I set about doing some exploratory investigation to find what is "out there" to use as a guide and how I might utilize what I find. The document that I eventually chose was the Specialised Stamp Catalogue from Stanley Gibbons, namely *Great Britain, Volume 4, Queen Elizabeth II, Decimal Definitive Issues.*

Now, although my copy is the fifth edition and was published in 1988, I do like the way that SG lays out their information. They even include some photos of the subject matter. Generally though, I'm discussing stamps here that were issued in the early part of the Machin era, long before the introduction of elliptical perforations or the newer security features and before the elimination of the ¹/₂ penny. So the chances that many new flaws will be recognized may be somewhat slim and I am certainly not interested in the catalogue values that were relevant when it was printed. So for me, it was the document that I used in combination with *The Deegam Machin Handbook*.

So then, how do I use the information that I have gained? This posed a difficult question. I certainly didn't want to have to resort to doing a cross check between a catalogue and several hundred copies of one particular stamp. Those that know me, know that I mount 90 stamps of the same type on a page for comparison purposes.

My solution was simple. It was to print a sheet with a blown up representation of the particular stamp (about 50mm x 60mm) in the upper part of the sheet and to accompany it with a numbered 32 lined box below. The flaws can then be indicated on the stamp picture and each one flagged with a number. The number is then cross referenced in the lower box with an appropriate description of the flaw. This sheet can then be readily used to cross review and interrogate all the appropriate stamps in my collection. Where it was necessary I supported the first sheet with a second sheet with numbers from 33 to 64. Anyway, that is how I have been conducting my checks for flaws.

"So when's the next excursion to APS?"

The question has been asked many times by Alliance club members when we have met at club meetings and local/regional shows. Dozens of people have spoken to me wanting to know the dates of the next trip to Bellefonte, Pennsylvania, home of the American Philatelic Center. At this point, it looks like we could be going in the Spring of 2014.

Here's the best information I can give you, taken from a short article in the August 2012 edition of *Gibbons Stamp Monthly*.

"The Smithsonian's National Postal Museum, located in Washington, DC has finally begun construction of the eagerly awaited William H. Gross Stamp Gallery. When completed, the museum hopes that the new gallery will be the world's premier museum gallery dedicated to philately. Scheduled to open in September of 2013, the gallery will enable the museum to dramatically increase the visibility of their collections and exhibits."





For those readers who are not familiar with the background to this story, Bill Gross is the U.S.

billionaire who traded his famous "z grill" early American stamp for a block of "inverted Jennys". Both items were priced at three million dollars. Since then, Mr. Gross had donated eight million dollars to the Smithsonian to renovate the Postal Museum to include a special gallery for his collection. The collection contains every American stamp printed. The money will also enable the museum to modernize the exhibits hall with hundreds of pullout frames to view collections and to provide many new facilities for research and study, as well as a renovated teacher centre. The next trip of GTAPA members will include a day in Washington to visit this new museum, before going on to Bellefonte to the American Philatelic Center for two and a half days. We will depart early on a Wednesday morning and arrive back in Toronto on the Saturday evening.

I will be working on the plans for the trip with Cheryl Ganz, curator of the Smithsonian National Postal Museum and Gretchen Moody at the American Philatelic Center. When the opening of the museum is confirmed, we will be able to finalize dates, transportation, hotels, meals and the full program for the four days. Registration forms will then be sent out to clubs for members to confirm reservations. Until then, circle April/May on your 2014 calendar as possible dates for this most exciting philatelic adventure.

Lettersheet

The term lettersheet describes the unstamped folded sheet letters used before envelopes became popular. Envelopes were not used much before the second half of the 19th century, because the postal rates in most countries calculated for the extra sheet of paper that made up the envelope, thereby increasing the cost of mailing when an envelope was used.

Pre-paid lettersheets, issued by postal operators, are postal stationery because they bear imprinted stamps, or indicia that indicate pre-payment, as opposed to adhesive stamps that are only printed by postal authorities. Lettersheets that require stamps to be applied have also been produced by private firms that usually have no authority for a pre-paid indicia, so postage must be paid by normal means at normal postage rates. The postal authorities of most countries have issued true lettersheets at some stage. However, most have discontinued their use, except in the form of an aerogram, due to the popularity of envelopes

The Universal Postal Union adopted the term aérogramme, the French word for air letter, during the 13th Postal Union Congress held in Brussels in 1952. Most countries inscribe this on their air mail lettersheets except for the United Kingdom which still uses the term Air Letter.

When Stamps Apparently Don't Belong

This card has always excited me; it comes from a little hoard sold some years ago at a local auction. It comes with me to various "drag and brag" sessions (also known as "show-and-tell" to the more fastidious). The oddity is of course the hexagonal stamp, which you will NOT find listed in Gibbons or in Scott. It was a telegraph stamp, and these have been delisted since about 1900 in both British and American catalogues of record.

However, as I understand the situation, when a local express letter service was introduced in Brussels in May, 1874 (added later in three other cities, Antwerp, Ghent and Liege, in 1875), the basic postage was paid in regular stamps and the surcharge for express service required the use of a *telegraph* stamp. Thus the odd combination on this card is in fact absolutely correct. In effect, the express fee was seen to be a "porterage" or local carriage charge similar to that offered telegraph senders, and was probably carried by telegraph messenger, so this was logical. Telegraph stamps could no longer be used to pay for this service as of Jan. 1, 1903.

Additionally, this card warms the cockles of my flinty heart since it is addressed to one giant of the early philatelic world, Judge Philbrick, a founding member of the Philatelic Society of London, and its second President (1878 to 1892). It was sent by his almost equally famous long-time friend (since 1863!) and collaborator, W.A.S.Westoby, a lawyer who undertook frequent business trips to the Continent. Together, the two published their master-work, *The Postage and Telegraph Stamps of Great Britain*, in 1881. In 1879, both in Brussels, Westoby pens a note: 'My dear Philbrick, If you have nothing better to do will you come and smoke your cigar with us in the evening. Yours ever...' We may be sure that the card crossed the city in so sprightly a fashion that the invitation was received and accepted!

Polish Army Interned in Switzerland 1940-1945

On September 1, 1939, German forces invaded Poland. Before the September Campaign had come to an end, about 85,000 troops of the Polish Army had managed to evacuate and escape to Romania. From there, they went to France where they regrouped and fought in the southern section of the front to help defend France from the German invasion. With the imminent fall of France, Marshal Philippe Pétain called for an armistice and demobilization on June 16, 1940. However, on June 19 General Władysław Sikorski, the Polish Commander-in-chief said that his troops would continue to fight as an ally of Great Britain and ordered them to reach French ports for a naval evacuation to England or, failing that, to cross the frontier into neutral Switzerland.

From June 17 to 19, 1940, The Polish Second Infantry Fusiliers Division of some 15,000 plus soldiers commanded by Brigadier General Prugar-Ketling, engaged in heavy battles in eastern France near the Swiss border. Although surrounded by German forces, they managed to break through and crossed the border into Switzerland on June 20 and 21, 1940. At the border the Polish soldiers laid down their arms and became interned under the control and protection of Swiss General Henri Guisan.

In Switzerland, the Polish soldiers, along with those of other allied countries, were placed in internment camps. They were generally treated well and worked in agriculture, road building and mining among other tasks. Just like prisoners of war, they were permitted free franking privileges for mail. Internee's mail was handled by the Swiss army field-post service.

Mail was censored and items show a 3 digit purple censor number. In addition each item had a round two circle cancel reading "Camp militaire d'internement *Suisse*" in the outer ring and "Franc de port" over the camp name in the centre. As well as regular envelopes, the internees used Swiss military stationery as well as ones specially prepared by the YMCA for use by military internees in Switzerland.

IFSCO Stamp Classification



There are many Scout Stamp clubs around the world. SOSSI (Scouts On Stamps Society International) is the biggest, and the only "international" one. Although the majority of their Chapters are in the USA (where SOSSI is based), they do have a variety of Chapters in countries like Canada, Japan, Mexico, Korea and others. Most of the European countries have their own independent clubs, as do other countries such as Australia and New Zealand.

In 1998 an organization called IFSCO (a French acronym for International Federation of Scout Stamp Clubs) was formed as an umbrella organization for all scout stamp clubs. The purpose was twofold – To provide one sole contact to major world scouting events (like World Jamborees & World Scout Conferences) and to develop standards for this particular hobby.

In 2006 IFSCO approved the **Scout Stamp Classification System** shown below:

Class A

Universal Postal Union (UPU) recognized country World Organization of the Scouting Movement (WOSM) recognized country or World Association of Girl Guides & Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) recognized country Design to be totally Scout/Girl Scout based within the stamp frame to honor Scouting or a Scouting event.

Class B

UPU recognized country WOSM/WAGGGS recognized country Design to include partial Scout/Girl Scout element within the stamp frame

Class C

UPU recognized country WOSM/WAGGGS recognized country Principal design not relating to Scouting, but Scout/Girl Scout badges or Baden-Powell cameo included within stamp frame or sheet borders

Class D

Non UPU recognized country, that is, an illegal or bogus issue WOSM/WAGGGS recognized or non recognized country Design Scout/Girl Scout related or Scout/Girl Scout badge or cameo inclusion in non Scout/Girl Scout design


Class E

Non official/private issues of restricted availability, for instance Personalized "P" stamps, Local private post, Christmas posts, Advertising event labels

Many of you may recall the proliferation of Trucial States "stamps" in the late 60's and early 70's. Some dubious stamp issues continued with emerging nations and again with some of the "...istan" break-away federations from the old USSR. Many issues appeared with, for example, a scout fleur-de-lis overprinted on a set of stamps showing mushrooms, or butterflies, and with expensive perf, imperf stamps & souvenir sheets.

This classification system can help both dealers and collectors communicate their collecting interests. For example, a collector could tell his dealer that he only wants Class A & B new issues. The dealer then knows not to order excess stock of Class C, D & E which he may never sell.

It's a good system that seems to be working well. Although specific to the Scouting topic, it probably could be adapted for other ones. *Tony*

Will commemoratives soon be a thing of the past? Peter Butler, FRPSC

At a recent meeting of the North Toronto Stamp Club, guest speaker Charles Verge (former president of *The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada*) told those in attendance to, "Forget about collecting commemoratives. There's no fun in that. Collect definitives with all their varieties, printings and usages. That's where the fun begins!"



Whether many listeners took the advice to heart that evening is not known but we all might be dragged kicking and screaming to that advice because there will be no alternative.

After having spent six months in Europe this year, visiting post offices to purchase commemoratives, talking to postmasters and questioning counter clerks about their sales of stamps, it became clear to me that most postal authorities are moving slowly to printing fewer commemoratives, mainly for collectors, and focussing their stamp sales on definitives.

Definitives can easily be printed over for many years at little cost compared to commemorative production. Commemoratives will only be available online directly from the postal authorities and specific post offices in large centres. We would call those centres, philatelic counters in post offices operated directly by their postal authorities. (e.g. Canada Post. Franchise post offices would not be included.)


In Canada we are lucky. Canada Post usually sends out commemoratives to all post offices. That has been policy for a long time. There have been exceptions to that practice but Canada Post has quickly heard collector dissatisfaction from areas where none were sent, because it was thought sales would be slow. Most countries do not make commemoratives available at all post offices, even if they are requested by postmasters. How long will it be until commemoratives are a thing of the past? In the United Kingdom very few post offices have commemoratives. Their stamp stock books are full of Machins for well over twenty different denominations so make up rates for any piece of mail can be made easily.

The USA has a similar policy of sending very few commemoratives to post offices. Collectors must order them from Kansas City, Missouri as we do from Antigonish, Nova Scotia or order them on-line.

Of course, this fact of life, coupled with the take-over of water-activated stamps by self-adhesives is enough to make mint collectors throw in the sponge or switch to collecting used stamps, but that's another story. Maybe it's time to think about Charles Verge's point of focusing on definitives, if you are not already a convert.

I've got a few thousand used Machins from the UK if anyone is interested!

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


Ukrainpex 2012 by Mark Stelmacovich

During the past four years, Ukrainpex was held in conjunction with a national show either in the USA or in Canada. However, this year the exhibition went solo, taking place in Toronto over the September 28-30 weekend at St. Demetrius-the-Great Martyr Church.

Planning for the event actually started over a year ago. The Ukrainian Collectibles Society (Toronto), a chapter of Ukrainian Philatelic and Numismatic Society (UPNS), was asked at last year's Ukrainpex to consider hosting the exhibition and its members voted unanimously in favour.

Members prepared for the work ahead in delivery, set-up, and tear-down of frames. Arrangements were successfully negotiated with a host location, St. Demetrius. An entry form and Prospectus was designed for publication in the June-2012 society newsletter *Trident-Visnyk*. Themes for the show were examined, eventually settling on those related to Bishop Nykyta Budka and Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk, for whom Personal Postage[™] stamps and a show cancel was designed and ordered from Canada Post. Event advertising was completed. Negotiations with hotels resulted in an arrangement with Travelodge, in the airport area, for out-of-town visitors to Ukrainpex 2012. Exhibit applications began filtering in during August and September.





Finally, Ukrainpex 2012 was happening! Witnessing fully eighty-seven frames containing philatelic, numismatic, and other collectible material, and two table-top displays, patrons were able to enjoy twenty competitive exhibits, nineteen non-competitive entries, as well as a court-of-honour that included twenty frames dedicated to Pope John-Paul II.

Visitors saw philatelic and numismatic entries representing both classic-era and contemporary Ukraine, classic-era medals and ribbons, displays of sports cards and autographed photos of Ukrainians, pre-production philatelic and numismatic material, classic-era stocks and bonds, and literature entries. There was also a bourse including six dealers, four of whom were specific to 'Ukrainica'. On Friday we welcomed student classes from St. Demetrius Ukrainian Catholic School.

Internationally accredited Frank Alusio acted as chief judge teaming up with UPNS's own Val Zabijaka. The twenty competitive exhibits were judged using national standards and the results speak to the quality of these entries. Ukrainpex 2012 exhibits achieved six golds, four vermeils, one silver, two bronze, and seven certificates.

The evaluation form judging criteria was as follows:

Treatment- title, title page, development, completeness, significance- 30 marks;

Knowledge, Study, Research- personal study, original research, analysis, evaluation- 35 marks;

Rarity, Condition- difficulty of acquisition, quality of material- 30 marks; **Presentation**- layout, identification, neatness- 5 marks.

Levels are as follows, based upon total marks: greater than 84 gold, 84-75 vermeil, 74-65 silver, 64-60 silver-bronze, 59-50 bronze, less than 50 certificate. Reviewing the evaluation form is extremely important as any given exhibit may have missed a level by the smallest of margins by a 'mistake', for example, as simple as an inaccurate title. The form also has a 'Commentary' section, where the exhibitor receives feedback related to specific issues and/or elements.

The gold medal winning exhibits included the following:

 <u>Ukrainian Scouting</u>, <u>Plast Postal Issues and Badges</u> - Frank Fursenko's year-2012 hardcover colour textbook published in Adelaide-Australia Government Paper Money of the Ukrainian National Republic, 1917-1920 – currency banknotes issued by the UNR during the fist years of independence 1917-1921

- <u>The Overprint and Use in Ukraine of the Two-Kopek Russian</u> <u>Coat-of-Arms Stamp</u> - an examination of the various Ukrainian overprints on the Russian two-kopek coat of arms stamp during the 1918 period of independence
- <u>Zemstvo (Rural) Stamps Used in Ukraine</u> Ukrainian zemstvo stamps were issued from 1866 to 1918
- <u>Ukraine's Contemporary Provisional Stamps, and a Wrapper, 1992-</u> <u>1995</u> - locally-created postal applications used to supplement the supply of national issues
- <u>Ukraine's Trident-Overprinted Russian Revenue Stamps of Podilia</u> <u>1918 to 1919</u> - extremely rare revenue material related directly to Podilia during 1918 and 1919

It takes some degree of courage to enter a competitive nationally judged exhibit one's first time. Congratulations to the following exhibitors who entered a competitive exhibit for their first time.


- Our new editor, Stepan Moskal entered the literature category with his first effort for our society newsletter <u>Trident Visnyk</u>, and received a silver
