This was yet another summer to remember. We stretched our road trip to the three day Royal*2014*Royale event in Halifax into 28 days of exploring the maritime provinces, learning more about the history of Newfoundland and Labrador, as well as experiencing the hospitality of Canadians.

The Halifax clubs hosted an excellent Royal and the city of Halifax turned on its summer weather on the very day that we arrived.



The hotel location, across from the century old Public Gardens, was perfect for a stamp show escapee like me. This traditional garden is very popular with Haligonians.

The awards banquet was held at Pier 21. This former port of entry has been turned into a museum and, thus, holds special significance for several of the Royal attendees. It was a perfect venue to reflect on the importance of the port of Halifax.

At the banquet John Sheffield announced Royal*2015*Royale. It will be hosted by Middlesex Stamp Club in London, Ontario, May 22 to 24, 2015. The theme will be, Remembering "In Flanders Fields".

Certainly World War I has both a philatelic and a personal meaning for most of us. There are some interesting World War I connections in this issue of the PhilaJournal. Tony Manson has uncovered yet another unusual Scouting link of interest to all readers while Jerry Piotrowski reports on a unique postage stamp that contains poppy seeds. Lloyd Yamada has an interesting post war article about World War I Vignettes in his Cinderella Philately column.

In 1914, my mother's grandparents visited Canada for two months. The purpose of their visit was to see their four grandchildren who had been born in Canada. My great grandfather kept a daily record of their activities including life aboard the Cunard liner, S.S Andania. (The ship was converted to a troop carrier in August 1914 and torpedoed off the Ulster coast in 1918.)

The entry written on board as they arrived back in England has special significance. My great grandfather wrote,

Sunday, August 4, 1914,

"Arrived at Plymouth about 12 midnight and found the port guarded by warships with search lights. On newspapers being received aboard we found that Germany had declared war against Russia and that France was involved. We did not go to bed, as we expected reach Plymouth earlier and we had notice that all passengers were to leave the vessel as soon as possible"

I found the port guarded by was high with search lights On neuspapers being received aboard we found that formany had declared war against Rossia + That France was involved - owing to the Servicen

Two of my five great uncles died at Ypres, Belgium in 1916. In 2012 we visited their graves outside of Ypres as well as the memorial in St. Peter's Church, Bournemouth.

"Isn't stamp collecting a dying hobby?"

This is a question that I am often asked. Of course the answer is "No!" One just has to attend an auction or show and sale to see that there are many collectors searching for elusive stamps, post cards, covers and other Philatelic material at any one of these events. Even while attending different clubs around the Durham area (where I live) I see new faces joining the various clubs.

For example, Brooklin held an auction at the end of July that attracted 65 bidders on a Tuesday evening. Not only was the participation for an evening event the largest they seen, but it was also the highest sales total they ever achieved.

Some of the member clubs in GTAPA are reporting great show results and increased membership. Of course the clubs that are most active normally have a dedicated group of club members working hard to provide an interesting, if not aggressive, program which helps attract new members and insure that their events are successful.

Another indicator of growth is the popularity of GTAPA's PhilaJournal. The PhilaJournal is now read by approximately 1,000 dedicated collectors. We have been receiving increased requests for subscriptions for this very professional publication. No doubt it is having an impact on the hobby.

Those who advertise in the PhilaJournal can be assured they are reaching the very people that they want to attend their show or club event. I may be a little biased, but if you want your club to be thought of as progressive + with a professional image, you do not want to miss the opportunity, and the advantages, of advertising in the PhilaJournal.

Recently I was told by a club president that they do all their advertising through local papers and that most are free. Does this really reach the collectors outside of their area and, for that matter, collectors in their own area? Does this maximize their efforts to draw more people? I do not think so. Why not do both?

In my local club we seem to get a new member every week. When they visit the club for the first time, they are welcomed, shown around the club and introduced to our members. We try not to overwhelm them but do ask them how they found us. Responses vary, as I am certain that you have found with new member drop ins. Common answers are; "through the GTAPA website, through your club web site, attending one of your seminars or participating in one of our four annual auctions".

At GTAPA we say, "We work best when we work together." The more that we welcome new members, attend shows and sales events in other areas, write articles for newsletters and talk about our hobby, the more confident we will be to say, "Stamp collecting is not a dying hobby!"

In March of 1974, a few enthusiastic individuals in Collingwood Ontario, got together in one of their homes and started the *Collingwood Coin and Stamp Club*. In the early 1990's as the membership grew, it was decided to have meetings in two locations each month, Collingwood and Wasaga Beach. Is it time for something new?

"It's been a few months since I sold my collection of early GB booklet panes. Interestingly, I have no regrets about parting with the collection. I like Crace's article very much. Too many times I have heard from collectors that they are "packing it in", closing the albums and cashing in their collections. Invariably they are not using the proceeds to start another collection; they are using the funds for something else. No new collection to start for them, and that's a pity. There are so many new ideas, particularly in the categories of thematics, postal history, social philately and postcards to get excited about that it literally "blows the mind" with possibilities.

For example: Over the past few months, I have noted the proliferation of advertisements for commemorative sets and covers celebrating the 100th anniversary of World War One. Many are so beautiful, exquisitely designed, thought-provoking in content and outstanding in printing techniques that it takes your breath away.

The two covers shown on the cover of this issue of PhilaJournal illustrate my point precisely. The covers are exclusively designed by Adrian Bradbury for *BFDC*, the Home of British First Day Covers, with only a limited edition of 100 sets created. The research in the production of the two covers is noteworthy and in a nutshell, they pay tribute to the one million horses requisitioned for battle by the British Army during the First World War.

Cover artist/designer, Adrian Bradbury, was interested in commemorating the plight of the hundreds of thousands of horses that died in the conflict.

In the war, horses were needed in large numbers; to mount cavalry charges, to pull heavy artillery guns to the front, to carry the wounded and to transport weapons and supplies. Later in the war, trench warfare, the easier deployment of the machinegun and the lesser importance of cavalry rendered horses of less value than initially.

Delving further into the history and the research on the issues and the concepts presented, one can easily imagine the many topics that would rise from reading and thinking about World War One. Many countries are in the midst of producing stamps commemorating the war from a myriad of the country's points of view, their history, their traditions, heroes and tragedies.

Have we convinced you that a new collection is definitely worthwhile in a different category? It's never too late to take on a new topic. It's time! Give it a chance!

The trip would be sometime in April, 2015, with tentative plans to:


- travel by highway coach with four different pick-up locations



Visit the Smithsonian National Philatelic Museum and the American Philatelic Center in April 2015



The postcard (above) of the American Philatelic Center is a drawing of what the artist hoped the Match Factory would look like a decade after the abandoned building was purchased by the APS/APRL. Today it looks much like what the artist envisaged. It is a dynamic place used by both local and philatelic communities.

The engraving (below)shows the U. S. Post Office Building, circa 1914. Later, it became the USPS museum and recently, with an eight million dollar renovation, opened as the Smithsonian National Postal Museum. It now displays the world's largest postal museum and the only complete collection of United States stamp anywhere. It is housed in the William H. Gross Stamp Gallery, named after the donor of the eight million dollars required to do the renovation.



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The GTAPA Challenge Award



"The GTAPA Challenge Award is a trophy donated by GTAPA member Garfield Portch to recognize club level, single frame exhibiting. Unlike the format of typical exhibitions, whose exhibitors compete on an individual basis, the Award will be contested among GTAPA Member Clubs. The competition is to be held at STAMPEX or some other local exhibition in which GTAPA is a participant.

Any GTAPA Member Club is eligible to enter a team of three exhibitors, each of whom will exhibit a single frame (16 pages) exhibit that conforms to current established rules of competition. The team entry is to be selected via a competition within each club with the three best exhibits forming the club team.

A jury, consisting of (at least) two National Judges will evaluate and score each exhibit in accordance with current standards. The award will be presented to the club having the highest aggregate score."*

If fewer than three (3) member clubs choose to participate, the Bramalea Stamp Club reserves the right to cancel the competition.



Sale of shoes for Scouts connects two world wars!

Occasionally while browsing through a box of dealer covers, one will find an old cover that not only looks very nice, but one that can lead to some interesting research. The cover below is one example.




The entire front of the envelope is in full color and advertises Scout, Guide and "Society" Shoes, and the fact that the sender is an Agent for Miner Rubbers. The reverse side shows it is from the Agent, Jackson & Savage Limited, a shoe store in Montreal. It has a brown 2 + 1T cent War Tax stamp issued August 29, 1916. It is cancelled on November 24, 1916 and addressed to someone in Ottawa.



The Miner Rubbers Company was formed in Granby, Quebec in 1911 and the owner, William Miner, successfully grew the business, employing over 1000 workers during World War One. The company ceased operations in 1982. William was a strong supporter of Scouting and made sure this was reflected in his products and ads. His shoe boxes had a large scouting label affixed across the top lid.

During the Second World War, Miner produced at least four different "Ink Blotters" on the Scouting theme. Two of them are shown below, including one with a Scout and Guide holding up a Canada 25 cent War Savings stamp. Boys and Girls are urged to "Buy – and get others to buy - Canada's War Savings Stamps to STAMP OUT HITLER!" ... thus not only promoting scouting, but the war effort as well.







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Postal Stationery Cut-outs

In philately, a cut square is an imprinted stamp cut from an item of postal stationery such as a stamped envelope, postal card, letter sheet, letter card, aerogram or wrapper in a square or rectangular shape. An alternative use of the term is simply any stamp, from sheets or postal stationery, cut in a square or rectangular shape and not cut to shape.

It is distinguished from the entire (the complete postal stationery item) or the more common practice of earlier eras of cutting to shape by removing all of the paper apart from the imprinted stamp. A variant of the cut square is the full corner which is a cutting of the corner to include the intact flap and back of the envelope as well as the front.

Just as used postage stamps were cut out, soaked and placed in an album, collectors also cut out postal stationery indicia and mounted them in albums. Now, the practice is frowned upon by most collectors who collect the entire postal stationary item, thus saving the envelope's postal history. To illustrate how far things have shifted in emphasis from the collection of cut squares, the most recent publications on 21st century stamped envelopes do not even mention cut squares, whereas its predecessor edition, just seven years earlier, devoted a section to their pricing.

The term cut square is differentiated from the term used on piece which denotes an adhesive stamp cut out in similar fashion from the original cover so as to preserve the entire postmark.



This 1912 registered letter to France is franked with 1¹/₂ d. Victorian postcard cut-out and a 1 d. Edward Registered letter cut-out.

It is the first time I have seen two cutouts on the same cover.

An irresistible cover

The cover shown above, in all of its bizarre splendour, was obtained from fellow North Toronto club member Derek Paul. It was enclosed in an eBay lot he had won from a seller in Changhua, Taiwan. I found it irresistible.

It was sent registered airmail and was franked on the rear with a complete souvenir sheet (face value of \$34 TW) with two values from the commemorative set and three stamps of the regular series on the front (a further franking of \$24 TW, totalling \$58 TW). However, one can hardly

distinguish the actual postage because of the exuberant proliferation of markings and adhesives.

I imagine very few postal administrations would tolerate the level of gameplaying that the sender achieved on this cover. Purporting to be sent from Great Coldland Province, it bears security underprinting with runic characters on it and the imprint of the Royal Printing Plant. The adhesives copy quite closely the issues of Taiwan and China but if you look closely you'll see borrowings from other administrations as well.

And, how about the handstamps? The black double-circles proclaim the attentions of the Coldland Customs Agency, while the red single-circle guarantees the cover as having passed through the Embassy of Coldland in Taiwan on May 15, 2010– a day AFTER the Changhua cancel was actually applied.

The cover is full of quirks and as philatelic as one can get. But it is self-referential to stamp collecting as a hobby, and well worth hanging on to. How many stamp references can you spot?

World War One Vignettes

The Kaiser Karl (Charles) patriotic vignettes appeared in 1917 following Karl's ascendancy to the throne of the dual kingdoms of Austria-Hungary. When Karl's brother, Archduke Franz Ferdinand was assassinated in Sarajevo, Karl was thrust into performing the duties of the heir presumptive. Unlike Ferdinand who was experienced in political and military matters, Karl had pursued a life devoted to Catholic teachings and now his life was to change.

Cinderella philatelists classify these lithographed labels as fund raising and charity stamps. Although Kreigsfursorge, or war welfare fund labels, were issued earlier during the war, these were the first official labels of the Kaiser Karl War Welfare Fund. Charity labels would be used on correspondence to indicate the sender's financial support of the fund. However, the greater purpose was their propaganda value.



Featuring Karl in military uniform, the vignettes were designed to instill confidence in him as General Field Marshall of the Austro-Hungarian Army. Each commemorative vignette celebrated previous victories against Russia and Romania as well as military success on the Italian front.

The Kaiser Karl an Stilfserjoch vignette from a military point of view signifies a major event on the Italian front. With the Austrians holding the high ground in the White War in the Tyrolian Alps, combined with the incompetent command of Luigi Cadorna, master of the frontal assault, the resulting carnage of the Italian army compelled Pope Clement XV to denounce war as a crime against mankind. Italian priests encouraged desertion as a moral choice and Karl began to



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seek a separate peace with France. The Allies pressured the Italian government to replace Cadorna and when the Germans discovered Karl's secret overtures for peace the Germans took over the command of the Italian front.

The vignette featuring Karl inspecting the care of the Austrian wounded was a central focus for the Kreigsfursorge. Ironically Alexander von Kobatin, Karl's field marshal who persuaded a reluctant Karl to authorize Austria's first use of poison gas at Stilfserjoch, was named by Karl to be the honorary president of the Kaiser Karl War Welfare Fund which continued until Karl's death in exile in Funchal in 1922. Now known as Blessed Charles of Austria, Karl received beatification in 2004 by Pope John Paul II.

A popular way to collect these poster stamps is by taking a thematic approach. This approach was suggested in the World War I Study Group Newsletter edited by Walter Schmidt in the 1980's. Labels and related ephemera would be restricted to those produced during the war years or 1919 if they are directly related to a service such as refugee relief. The study of these vignettes offers the Cinderella philatelist a greater understanding and appreciation of the historical context for which these labels were produced.

Machin Head Post & Go Faststamps

In this issue I would like to review and discuss the area that some collectors find problematic, that of Machin Head "Post & Go Faststamps". I use the term problematic simply because some collectors do not consider them as true postage stamps. In North America we do not see these types of stamps with the regularity that our counterparts do in Great Britain. However, reading some of the printed articles about these items demonstrates that they are becoming popular among collectors and are now almost a thematic field in their own right. I have only addressed the Machin Head Post & Go Faststamps, for this article, and have disregarded all the others such as flags, birds, sheep, pigs, cattle, flowers, rivers and lakes.

The "Machin Head Faststamps" below are thermally printed with detailed information as required, from special machines. They were first introduced in October 2008 at a Post Office in Bristol. Five distinct fonts have now been used for the issues, as seen in the close up illustration of the printed sections of the Machin Head Fastamps over this seven year period.



Oct 2008 – Type 1 used a large font

Sep 2010 – Type 2 used a smaller font

23 Feb 2011 – Type 3 used slightly thicker letters


19 Feb 2014 – Type 4 used a narrower font

28 Feb 2014 – Type 5 used a thinner font A question was raised regarding the deliberate ploy by Royal Mail to increase philatelic sales of Post & Go Faststamps. Their spokesperson stated that it was a technology issue with each generation of machine taking advantage of the latest and faster printers.

In addition, Royal Mail has been using the Post & Go machines to print Machin Head Faststamps with special inscriptions at exhibitions and for special events. Hence the first inscription was at the Autumn Stampex of 2011 and was to commemorate Arnold Machin with "Arnold Machin 1911-1999". To date 10 different Post & Go inscriptions have been issued by Royal Mail.



I hope these tips will help you with your Machin collection.

A forgotten page of history: The Ukrainian prisoners of war in Italy (1945 – 1947)

At the end of World War II, the Allied Forces opened a prisoner of war camp in Rimini, North Eastern Italy, near the local airport. The Ukrainian prisoners, who had fought against the Russians for the independence of their country, were lodged in Camp 1.

In the group there were quite a few highly educated people who did not waste any time transforming the camp into a small Ukrainian village. They immediately started to build a small chapel where they celebrated Mass every day. Then they organized a band and a choir to liven the atmosphere of the camp. The next project was the printing of stamps for the transportation of mail from one camp to another to generate some profit to finance some entertainment and to support the more needy prisoners.

164 Ukrainian prisoners became members of a philatelic club and initiated some contacts and common meetings with the Italian Rimini stamp club after obtaining authorization by the Allied Forces. Communication between the two groups was not difficult as quite a few members of both groups could speak some French.

In August 1946 the first set of stamps was issued. Some other sets followed and in one year about 40 different stamps were printed. The first issues were priced in kryvnia, the last ones in liras.

In June 1947 the camp was closed and the Ukrainians immigrated to England, the USA or Canada. Returning home would have meant facing detention or a death sentence by the Russians. Before leaving the camp, the Ukrainians published a booklet "A Goodbye to Italy" to say farewell to their Italian friends and particularly to the stamp collectors of the Rimini stamp club.

The Ukrainian prisoners' camp stamps were printed in small quantities. They are very difficult to find today. They have not been listed yet in any specialized catalogue although there is a growing pressure from the philatelic community to include them in some major catalogues in the future. They show up, from time to time, in some European auctions as individual stamps, never as complete sets. They sell very well, and very quickly.

If you ever happen to find one of these stamps and decide to sell it, do not try to sell it through traditional dealers who probably have no knowledge about this particular issue. Your best bet would be to sell them through a major auction house or through an internet channel like e-Bay or similar. There are many specialized collectors out there who are actively searching for these stamps and would not miss the chance to bid on them.

Unusual Postage Stamps

Several postal authorities have issued stamps which contain flower or vegetable seeds. Jersey Post joined that group on May 6 of this year when it issued a set of 6 stamps and a souvenir sheet showing paintings of poppies in commemoration of the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War.



In addition to sets of mint stamps, Jersey Post will also sell a special pack containing the 46p and 56p stamps with poppy seeds attached. Half of the money collected from these packs will be donated to the Jersey branch of the Royal British Legion.

Jersey Post says: "Poppy seeds have been integrated in two of the designs, sealed behind a thin, transparent, bio-degradable plastic cover. The stamps can be used for posting letters as usual but they can also be planted, gradually decomposing as the seeds start to grow, producing the striking red flowers which are so strongly associated with remembrance."



The Channel island of Alderney recently issued a set of stamps featuring the famed Bayeux Tapestry. The tapestry was commissioned by William the Conqueror's half-brother Bishop Odo to celebrate the victory over King Harold at the Battle of Hastings in 1066. It was unveiled in 1077 at the dedication of the Bayeux Cathedral. The tapestry shows events from a Norman point of view from the death of King Edward the Confessor to the Norman victory over the English.

Historians long believed that there was a missing section to the tapestry probably showing the coronation and reign of William. So a 10 foot long panel was designed to fill that gap and then hand stitched on the island of Alderney by over 400 people, both local residents and visitors, including Prince Charles.

The new panel was reproduced on a souvenir sheet printed on cotton.

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A Postcard from Hell


If you are a tourist visiting the Cayman Islands, sooner or later you will meet somebody who will tell you in a convincing tone that, "You should go to Hell". I would recommend that you follow their advice and ask your local guide how to get there. Hell is a group of short, black, limestone formations located in the West Bay section of the Grand Cayman Island. The formations are viewed from platforms. It is not clear where the name Hell came from, but the most common explanation is that the locals started saying: 'This is what Hell must look like.'



In any case, the name stuck, and the area has now become a tourist attraction, featuring a post office from which you can send "postcards from Hell" and buy a wide selection of Cayman island stamps and affix them to your postcards or letters. Any item mailed at

the Hell post office will bear a distinct Hell cancel.

In the local shops near the Hell post office you can also buy all sort of postcards with pictures of the Hell landscape and all types of humorous Some slogans.



tourists and stamp collectors are very imaginative in writing their postcards. Some come prepared to create some unique items by mailing them to Paradise Island in the Bahamas or to the town of Paradise, Newfoundland or Paradise Hill in Saskatchewan.

During my trip to Hell, I also discovered that there is a town of Purgatory in Maine and a town of Hell in Michigan. Perhaps you also know some related destinations! If you are visiting the Cayman Islands on a cruise ship that stops there only for a few hours, you might not have enough time to visit the village of Hell.



To send a letter or a postcard with the Hell cancel, you will find a shortcut available in the port town of Georgetown.

Talk to Ivan Burges, owner of the local stamp shop The Penny Black. For a nominal

fee Ivan will make sure that your mail is cancelled from Hell.

Visiting Ivan's shop is a refreshing experience, especially for someone from Toronto, where the traditional stamp shops have practically disappeared. Its show windows full of a huge variety of stamps and souvenir sheets from the Caribbean Islands, its unique layout with the counter in the middle and shelves all around, will give you the opportunity to spend hours admiring all the stamps and philatelic material he has on display.

World War II and Italian Stamps

Wars cause painful disruption on countries and people. This is true not only on people and countries directly involved in the war, but also on other countries around the world.

At the end of World War II, Italy suffered both economically and politically. Thousands of people were homeless and many towns, villages and sections of cities were destroyed. In addition to hundreds of priceless monuments and religious artefacts, many vital installations including power plants, railroads, ports, government buildings, hospitals, etc. were destroyed. Farms were left unattended during the war, and thus little food was available and not all water was safe to drink. Disease killed many of the survivors of the war.

Since 1940, prices of goods had risen over 750%. Italian stamps issued prior to, and during, WW II were mostly for denominations of less than one lire.

The first issues after the war were for various denominations up to 100 lire. Scott catalogue values for 1944-1947 post war issues are very reasonable in both mint and used condition, although a couple of mint issues are valued at around \$200.00 each.

The Allied Military Government left Italy in December 1945 (except for the Trieste area—See PhilaJournal Spring 2014 issue pages 16-17). In the following June the Italians voted in favour of a Republic. This ended the Kingdom of Italy and the king, Victor Emanuel III, abdicated and fled to Egypt.

Because Italy was hoping for a brighter future, the new stamp designs symbolized breaking the chains from the fascist dictatorship, planting trees and vital crops, and showing Italia and the torch, created a belief in the growth of a new Italy.

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
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
